# DIRECTOR'S REPORT

appointments that have been made in the SFG recently. On February 5 I received a letter from Harry Thomas in which he expressed regret that he must resign his post as Official Historian of the SFG. Though I regretted having to accept his resignation, I realized that the reasons he gave made it a necessity. Harry is a student at the University of Georgia and his academic work puts a serious press on his time so that little time is left to devote to the multiple duties of Historian. In fact, he felt that his grades had suffered to some degree by his trying to carry the double load of college work and fanac. Added to this was a serious illness which had put him in the hospital (from which he wrote me his letter of resignation). His resignation is hereby officially accepted.

Before going on to appoint a new Historian, I would like to express the sincere gratitude and appreciation of the SFG for the outstanding job Harry Thomas has done with the post of Historian. In many organizations this office is allowed to devolve into nothing more than an honorary post, but through the tireless and enthusiastic efforts of Harry Thomas the Historian became an important and active post. And it was he who conceived the plan to work toward compiling a History of Southern Fandom. Through countless letters of contact with fans, following leads of every kind, and procuring and evaluating a large mass of material (letters, clippings, club records, con-reports, books and fanzines), Harry succeeded in making a significant start on that fascinating history. Thanks, Harry, and we all wish you a speedy

recovery.

Several months ago I received a letter from Joe Christoff in which he said he would be interested in serving as Historian if the post became vacant. So shortly after receiving Harry's resignation I wrote to Joe, asking if he would take the post. I quote from his answer of February 12: "Your letter marked 'important' on the outside envelope was indeed that to me. I appreciate the opportunity of doing something for the SFG. My reply is in the affirmative. I would like very much to be Historian." Therefore, I hereby officially appoint Joe Christoff as the Official Historian of the SFG. And thanks, Joe, for answering "the call" with such fine spirit.

Here are a few facts about Joe which will help you to get to know him and also demonstrate what a tru-faan he is. Joe is 36 years old and is employed as an advertizing sales & service representative, commuting between Atlanta, New York and Florida. He has been a reader of stf for over twenty years and collects such mags as Amazing, TWS, Astounding, Weird Tales, Black Cat and Unknown, plus 5000 books of which 60% are hardcovers. Collecting-wise he also has many stf record albums, movie stills, rare book-covers, original cover-paintings and black-and-white illos. Joe is well-known and has many contacts in fandom. He collects fanzines (some 500 at present) and previously pubbed Oberon, but now pubs Sphere in which a number of significant polls and surveys have been conducted. Joe also writes fiction, articles, verse and does artwork. ("Remember Christoff?....the faan with nine hands?")

Henceforth all information and material to be sent to the historian should be sent to Joe Christoff, P.O.Box #121, Gulf Breeze, Florida.

We know of at least 18 fanzines being pubbed by southern fans; so far only two of these have carried information concerning the SFG. To utilize this source of publicity and to direct all SFG publicity I am appointing a Publicity Director. He is Bob Williams, 4425 Rear West Pine, St. Louis, Missouri. I hereby officially appoint Bob Williams as Official Publicity Director of the SFG. Welcome to the fold, Bob.

Bob is an active and talented fan. He is 25 years old and employed in direct mail advertizing. A reader of stf for some twelve years and a collector of such mags as F&SF, Astounding, Galaxy, If, FFM, FN, Amazing, Fantastic, TWS, Startling, Weird Tales and Super Science—about 1700 items. Fandom—wise he collects fanzines (approx. 150) and has contributed verse and fmz—reviews to Sata, Sigma Octantis and Spectre. Bob also is an excellent writer of fiction, book—reviews and articles.

Henceforth all suggestions and activities for publicizing the SFG should be cleared through the office of Publicity Director.

We are now at work planning a Membership Committee. We aren't very sure just what its procedure or activity would be, but we are working on it with Ted Brooke, who has volunteered to head such a committee. Both Ted and I would like to hear from any of you who have any ideas or suggestions in re such a committee.

A letter from Lloyd D. Broyles, Chairman of the Activity & Benefits Committee (ABC), reports they have an RR in operation and several points under discussion. We may have an important and interesting benefit to offer for the consideration of the membership in the next issue of TSE.

### THE PATHETIC REVIEWER

FIRST IN LINE this month is a clothbound novel published by Dodd, Mead & Company: The Haunted Stars, by Edmond Hamilton. Ex-readers of Planet Stories, Thrilling Wonder, Startling, et al; ex-fans and ex-revilers of Captain Future; stand by for a shock.

The Haunted Stars isn't great. It is good. It is not only good Hamilton, it is best Hamilton. No worlds are wrecked. No worlds are rescued. The plot is not excitingly new. The protagonist is not infallible. He isn't even a scientist, in the accepted sense of the word. He is a linguist, without gun, doubled fist, sword, superior mental powers, or great inventive genius. And he is well-drawn. You will know this man. There is no heroine, as such, but the girl is lovely and real. The "villain" (who isn't, really) is not painted black—not even charcoal gray. He is a military man, but not a prototype.

The foregoing, although negatively written, is glowing praise. I've thrown rocks at Mister Hamilton in the past. Even formed the habit (although, just like the rest of you hypocrites, I read and enjoyed his work). Now, I'm not at all disappointed at being forced to resort to what we used to call bouquets, as opposed to brickbats. The man has always been a fine teller of tales. Now he has matured and settled and begun to draw character portraits. With one or two more pieces of work such as The Haunted Stars, I could even become a non-hypocritical

Hamilton fan!

There is available, incidentally, a Science Fiction Book Club copy.

I've just read two pocket editions: A Theodore Sturgeon called Venus Plus X (Pyramid Books HG554) and a Robert Sheckley called The Status Civilization. Both interesting, both "different," both somewhat

disappointing.

There is much mouthing about sex and lack of sex in science fiction and fantasy. Some are fer, and some are notly agin (ask the Friendly Editor of Si-Fan about the latter; the Unfriendly Editor of Galaxy about the former). Not the Bergey brand of sex. Not even the ole-time brand of sex recalled in "Girls for the Slime God" in the November Playboy. Not the Beacon type of sex. Evidently not the beautiful Finlay brand of sex; the art he's doing for Galaxy now no longer features his carefully-barely-draped females we used to love.

Then what brand of sex? Oh, you know...SEX sex. (For a further discussion, handled well, c.f. The Reference Library in the April

Analog.)

Well, a man has attempted it and for my money it didn't quite work out. And I couldn't be sorrier. Mister Sturgeon's Venus Plus X features some he-she-it people who enjoy mutual procreation. By mutual I don't mean the obvious; I mean the man (or woman, if you prefer) and his (her; its) mate both bear children; both possess both equipment.

I can't tell you much without giving away some things, but suffice it to say that a today-type fellow named Charlie Johns is "kidnaped" by these people (the "Ledom"; tobacco-can spelled backwards) for the primary purpose of exposing him to their civilization by degrees and

observing his reactions. He displays our brutish, backward, biased, bastardly XX Century attitudes, unfortunately.

Now. Despite the fact that I think it didn't come off and was rather tediously school-roomishly done besides, I recommend the book.

With this reservation-admonition. Skip every other chapter, starting with the first. In other words, skip one, three, five, etc. The alternate chapters constitute a brilliantly done look at Us. It's apparently laid a very few years hence. All right, so it is one more condemnation of Modern Man and Suburbia. But first, it isn't done by a professional rock-thrower. Second, it's done in fictional form...a series of vignettes about a couple of couples and their children and their habits and their attitudes, especially their attitudes toward sex. ("Don't do that. It isn't nice.") Or perhaps I should say our attitudes rather than using the pronoun "their"...taken together or separately, the vignettes form an essay, certainly not 35¢ worth of novel.

I think they're 35¢ worth of essay. Samatterafack I intend going back and rereading them...without the unfortunate Ledom story.

I'm a sucker for status civilization novels. I'll never forget and stop reading The Syndic, among others. I'm also a sucker for what-if... stories.

Robert Sheckley gives us both in The Status Civilization. And I'm afraid I'm not a sucker for it, although it's strictly for suckers.

Now I hate to fall into the trap which lies open for and sucks in most reviewers. That of writing, deliberately and maliciously, what is termed in Vardis Fisher's brilliant and rabble-rousing God or Caesar? as the "killer" review. We all read them constantly. Home town reviewers who seem never to see a good movie. The slick literary critics (and how I hate that word as opposed to "evaluators") who have read everything for alltime and find nothing new, nothing fresh, nothing good. The television reviewer...many newspapers are now carrying the work of a man who hasn't enjoyed one television play since he began writing "reviewer" after his name.

The trap is there, awaiting all who attempt to read and evaluate. When I find myself sliding into it I'll stop.

On the other hand an evaluator has a certain responsibility. No more should he write all killers than should he praise everything. It doesn't help anyone at all; not the readers, not the publishers, not the writers, not himself, if he deliberately lies or overlooks or just plain neglects to review that which is not up to par.

I have waxed somewhat philosophic and digressed from the subject and the book at hand. But for two reasons...first I write and have written and know about the work and the sting of bad reviews. And I nave always had a feeling that the phrase "Guis custodiet ipsos custodies?" ("Who should guard the guards themselves?") should be applied to reviewers. Strenuously.

To return to Mister Sheckley's novel: Take a penal planet. Take a tough hero, a regular Paladin with a gun, who's on the penal planet, although of course on a bum rap. The friendly inmates have a tight and nasty status system. The way to get ahead is to notch your gun.

The hero gets ahead. He Overcomes All Obstacles. It is possible I may have missed one or two...but I counted four slow-returning-to-consciousness-scenes. All formed the first few lines of chapters.

Guess what happened right at the end of the preceding chapters.

### THE PATHETIC REVIEWER

I won't tritely say he can do better. Good grief, he's done better, again and again.

Over two months ago I picked up an Ace Double: Philip K. Dick's Vulcan's Hammer and John Brunner's The Skynappers. Somehow I've never gotten into either. The covers didn't help...I am interested in the Brunner: what's a skynapper? Well, someone who takes a nap in the sky, obviously. Don't shake your head...two p's means sleeping. One p means abducting. Small point? Perhaps. But just how many publishers are sloppy enough to allow an ungrammatical title slip through?

Of course the story may be about someone who takes a nap in the

sky, in which case I apologize.

Wait! Hold on...consulting Webster's New World Dictionary of the American Language, I find that two p's have become acceptable. The old spelling is listed first, but "kidnapped-kidnapper" etc. is evidently now copesetic. Far be it from me to argue with the ninety-eight editors of this august lexicon.
