CHATTANOOGA FOR DSC IN 1990: Sunday morning at DeepSouthCon 26 [Atlanta], Chattanooga's bid for DSC 28 went unopposed. Chairman Bill Zielke & the Chattacon committee, sponsors of the bid, announced that DSC 28 will be held June 7-10, 1990 at the Southern Inn in East Ridge. MASHVILLE FOR DSC IN 1991: Kubla Khan's Chairman Ken Moore has announced his intention to bid for 1991's DSC 29. Of this first-ever Nashville bid for a DSC, Khen says if he wins the bid KUBLA KHAN would coincide with the DSC, it being unthinkable to put on two such large cons in such a short period of time.

REBEL & PHOENIX AMARDS FOR 1988: Just for the record (as the news is already stale) receipients of the annual awards presented at DeepSouthCon were: the PHOENIX to Gerald W. Page (the 1st individual ever to hold both the fan & the professional award) & the REBEL, this year once more a dual award: one to Sue Phillips & another to mike weber (sic).

Mhile the practice of presenting a double award to a married couple (each of whom has been separately active in serving Southern fandom) is not unheard of, there's been no small amount of complaint from numerous quarters that the vice-chair of the DSC in question was one of the receipients of the award. This writer believes that Sue was totally unaware of the impending "nepotism" & is thus blameless in the matter. Future DSC concoms should perhaps be alert & strive against a recurrence of this "faux pas".

Dick & Micki Lynch report the establishment of the "First

Fandom Transfer Fund" (affectionately called the "Old Fart Fan Fund"). Its purpose: to help a member of First Fandom attend Worldcon. The first recipient, appropriately enough, is Wilson "Bob" Tucker. The goal was to raise \$260 to pay for Bob's plane ticket & meals for NolaCon. An auction held at Rivercon put them over the top, & there was even enough extra so (with a little help from NolaCon) they'll have enough to help Lee Hoffman out with her Worldcon expenses as well. 




#### OUR PURPOSE...



The 1987 annual meeting convened at 9:35 a.m. with Vice-president P. L. Caruthers-Montgomery presiding in the absence of the President. There were 28 members and others in attendance. The breeze cooled the audience seated under the canvas tent outside the Huntsville Marriott.

No summary of activity for the preceding year was presented as there had been no activity on the part of the SFC.

A brief discussion was held concerning voting rights at the meeting since the dues structure has lapsed during the previous few years. Voting priviledge would be granted at the discretion of the presiding officer for this meeting.

The election of officers for 1987-88 was held with the following being named by acclamation:

President:

Vice-president:

G. Patrick Molloy

Secretary/Treasurer:

J. R. Madden

A motion by Rickey Sheppard, seconded by Guy Lillian:

The SFC will petition ConFederation (WorldCon Atlanta Inc.) to provide goods and services to the SFC for a short term. The purpose would be to have WAI produce and distribute some issues of the SFC Bulletin until such time as the SFC is able financially to resume sole publication. PASSED.

The meeting adjourned at 10:00 a.m.

The meeting convened at 10:05 a.m. with President P. L.

Caruthers-Montgomery presiding and all other officers present. There were 38 members and others present.

The President made the opening remarks welcoming the membership and pointing out the agenda and by-laws handouts on the seats of the hall.

Secretary/Treasurer Madden read the minutes of the 1987 annual meeting. A motion to accept the minutes was made by Tim Gatewood, Memphis, and seconded by Mike Dillson, Chattanooga; the motion was passed by voice vote.

The activities of the SFC for the past year were reported by the President:

- Following several years of moribund activity, the new officers of the SFC had to struggle a bit to get things started again. It has been a successful effort.
- A new database of Southern fans was established using the mailing list from ConFederation (WorldCon Atlanta Inc. or WAI) along with other lists sent in by the various clubs across the South.
- Two issues of the SFC Bulletin were produced. The first issue was printed and mailed by WAI on behalf of the SFC to over 3000 fans. The second issue was printed by WAI but will have to be distributed by the SFC due to the large number of returns from the first issue. Future issues of the Bulletin will be distributed only to dues-paid or dues-exempt members, trade fanzines, and those chosen by the President.

Due to the press of SFC business, President Caruthers-Montgomery had to renege on her promise to LOC all fanzines received. President Caruthers-Montgomery commended her minions, the other two officers and Official Recruiter Sue "Give me \$3" Francis, for their assistance in the past year. She presented all three with tokens of her appreciation.

A motion to commend the officers of the SFC for their work was made by Richard Gilliam, Tampa, and seconded by D. Briskman, Atlanta; the motion was passed by voice vote.

After a brief interlude with the Secretary/Treasurer attempting to follow Roberts' Rules of Order, P. L. Caruthers-Montgomery was nominated and elected by acclamation to be President of the SFC for 1988-89.

A motion to suspend the rules of election was made by K. Tarpley, seconded by Pam Alm, Atlanta; passed by voice vote.

A motion by Tim Gatewood, Memphis, seconded by Curt Phillips, was made to re-elect by acclamation the other two officers to their positions for the coming year; passed by voice

A motion was made by D. Briskman, Atlanta, to raise the dues of the SFC from the current \$3 per year stipulated in the Bylaws. By voice vote, the rules were suspended to permit free discussion of the issue.

DISCUSSION: The dues are set by the Bylaws at \$3. Presently, this is far too low to permit continued operation of the SFC. \$5 dues would be easier to collect at conventions as it would require less change to be made. Dues between \$5-10 would be harder to collect in person. Dues \$10 and higher would make operation of the SFC easier but would reduce the numbers willing to join. The SFC started after DSC in 1987 with zero money and has about \$400 in its accounts as of 5/15/88 so the situation is better. Clubs and individuals have been generous with donations in the past and it is hoped this will continue. The officers felt they could operate through the coming year with dues at \$5 and then raise the amount at the next annual meeting if it is warranted. A straw poll of the membership was conducted with the majority favoring the \$5 amount.

A motion was made by Tim Gatewood, Memphis, seconded by D. Briskman, Atlanta, to amend the Bylaws, Section 4, to state "Dues for the SFC are \$5.00 per year ..."; passed by voice vote.

DISCUSSION: The Bylaws, Section 5, state, regarding the publication of the Bulletin, "The official SFC bulletin shall be published on at least a semi-annual basis, though more often as finances permit. One issue shall appear not more than one month prior to the DeepSouthCon, and one issue shall appear in the month of January." This was written when the DSC was usually held the weekend prior to the WorldCon. Presently, the DSC is being held in June of each year and the mandated schedule is not suitable. The officers intend to publish quarterly if at all possible but prefer to leave the first sentence requiring two issues but permitting more to stand as is. The second sentence should be changed or deleted entirely. A straw poll indicated the membership would prefer, if only two issues came out, that one be in January and the second immediately after the DSC to permit reporting on any changes resulting from the annual meeting.

A motion was made by D. Briskman, Atlanta, seconded by Mike Dillson, Chattanooga, to strike the following sentence from Section 5 of the Bylaws, "One issue shall appear not more than one month prior to the DeepSouthCon, and one issue shall appear in the month of January." Passed by voice

A motion was made by Ken Moore, Nashville, to annex the city of Evansville, Indiana, and Highway 41 leading into the city.

DISCUSSION: The sf club and various individuals in Evansville have been very helpful in getting the SFC back on its feet. However, due to Section 1 of the Bylaws, they are precluded from membership in the SFC. Evansville is further south than Louisville, Kentucky. There should be a means whereby those residing outside the South, who happen to be Southerners at heart, may join the SFC. The naming of specific cities or individuals would lead to a cluttering of the Bylaws; giving discretion to the President to permit folks to join the SFC should suffice. A friendly amendment to the motion was proposed, in general terms, by J. R. Madden, Baton Rouge, and accepted by Mr. Moore.

A motion by Ken Moore, seconded by Carl Pearson: Add, as a second paragraph, to Section 1 of the Bylaws: "The President shall have the discretion to name as "Southern Sympathizers" persons or groups outside the South for the purpose of membership and participation in the SFC."

Guy H. Lillian, III asked about the current finances of the SFC. The Secretary/Treasurer apologized for not having the figures at hand but estimated about \$800 of income had been generated by dues and contributions while about \$400 had been spent on printing, postage, supplies, and long distance phone calls leaving about \$400 to carry forward. A statement of the finances will be in the third issue of the Bulletin.

Tim Gatewood offered two suggestions:

The President should appoint "correspondents" in various large cities across the South for the purpose of gathering information for the Bulletin. Knowledgeable people, familiar with local fan activities, would be able to get more and current information.

The famous SFC patch should be re-issued as a fund

A motion to adjourn was made by Tim Gatewood and seconded by Owen Johnson; passed loudly by voice vote. The meeting adjourned at 11:03 a.m.





# Computer Bulletin Board Systems by William C. Francis

Twenty years ago desktop computers were a dream of science fiction. Twelve years ago they were something put together by hardware hackers out of a kit or, for the most dedicated, individual components. Then in 1978 Radio Shack began marketing a desktop computer, the Model I TRS-80, followed quickly by Apple and slowly by IBM. The new hobby grew faster than the ability of magazine and book publishers to meet the demand for information on using the systems. Users began swapping information, sometimes in person but more often over a BBS. BBS stands for Bulletin Board System and to this day I'm still not sure if the plural is "BBSs", "BBSes" or "BBS's".

A BBS consists of a computer, a telephone line, an autoanswer modem, and software to control the process. A user has
his terminal or computer using a terminal emulation program
call the host computer through his modem. The host modem (for
MOdulator-DEModulator if you must know) answers and triggers
the host software running on the host computer. The modems
translate digital information into sound that can be sent over
telephone lines, then translate it to something that computers
or terminals can understand through their serial ports. And
that's about as technical as I'm going to get. (Mostly because
it's about all that I understand.) You don't need to
understand exactly how a modem works or which IRO you need to
use for COM2 in order to get the benefit of onlining any more
than you need to know the theory of internal combustion in
order to drive to the grocery store.

There are thousands of BBSes available. Some are free while some charge for their use. Most have some sort of focus, like a type of computer or other special interest, such as, whh, I don't know, maybe — Science Fiction. (I could put a Blatant Plug in here but I won't. Maybe later — stay tuned.) Many are an electronic meeting area for exchange of public domain software and software known as freeware and shareware, and there are even underground boards where there is illegal trading of copyrighted software. Others concentrate on the exchange of information about a specific hardware system or perhaps a certain software package. BBSes come and go as SysOps (System Operators) start up systems or, for one reason or another, shut them down.

What do you need to explore the world of onlining? First something to act as a terminal — usually a computer running terminal emulation software, also known as communications software. You need a modem to connect your terminal to the telephone line. And you need a telephone number of a BBS. How do you find one? There is a listing updated monthly in Computer Shopper but usually users post the number on other

boards, so that advertising is more word-of-modem than anything else.

When you find the number of a BBS, you will probably find some cryptic mixture of letters and numbers like "300/1200:81N" or "300/71E" or it may be clearer like "Word length 8 bits, no parity, 1 stop bit, 300 or 1200 baud". (That's CLEARER???) Don't panic. These are parameters used to describe the way the systems should be set up to talk to each other. Baud rate is simply a way of expressing the speed of transmission. 300 and 1200 baud (which is I will call characters per second which is close enough for this discussion) are the most common speeds that you will see, although 2400 baud is beginning to show up also. Your modem is capable of operating at one or more of these speeds.

You can purchase a 300/1200 internal (to go inside the computer) or external (in its own box) for under \$100 from most mail order houses provided you are willing to settle for a Hayes compatible, which has an internal processor with a set of commands that has become standard in the industry. If you want a Hayes modem, you will pay more. (Some of you may have experienced the same sort of situation when deciding whether to buy a True-Blue IBM or a Taiwan Special Compatible.) There are also very plain modems available without any processing ability that you switch on and off by hand. These cannot perform the duties of a modem for a host BBS because they are not able to answer the phone. The speed of a Hayes or Hayes compatible modem can be controlled by a switch or button (if it is a multispeed type) or by certain of these commands.

You do not have to go out and learn these commands, however. Most modern communications software has the ability to send these commands to the modem automatically. There is also provision for changing parameters, such as word length, parity and stop bits. Again, most communications software is able to set these up directly so that you can use them without the vaguest idea what they mean. Most commonly you will see "81N"; "71E" is also used frequently. Before you dial up the BBS, you will need to set these the same as the host system or you will most likely get something that looks like garbage, with a random appearing mixture of letters and graphics characters. When that happens, just reset your parameters and try again.

So you have your modem plugged into the phone line and your comm (short for communications) program running. If your comm program is a full featured one it will include a dialer so you can enter the phone number into a datafile along with parameters so that you don't have to change them each time you get ready to call another system. You enter the number of the BBS you have found and you start the call. If your modem has a speaker and it is on you will here the dial tone followed by the number and either a busy signal or a brief flurry of raucous noise before the modem speaker is cut off. see the welcome prompt of the system you are calling on the screen. It will give the name of the system and then ask for your name. In most cases, you will be expected to register as a new user and have only the ability to take a brief look at some of the materials available until the SysOp has the opportunity to upgrade the access level - that is, tell the system to give you permission to do more things. Some SysOps require only real names and will give regular access only to users that can be confirmed, while others allow Handles (pseudonyes) and give free run of the system immediately. Please comply with the desires of the SysOp, because most of them are running systems on a strictly voluntary basis and usually are paying for the phone lines as well as tying up their computers for the use of, well, users.

Once you have been registered and given authorization, there are several functions you can expect from a BBS. There will be one or more message boards where users can read messages left by other users and leave messages for anyone logging on the system to read. There will be an E-mail section (as in Electronic mail) for private messages between individual users. There will be areas for uploading and downloading (transmitting and receiving) programs and other files. There may be separate message boards and file sections for different interest areas. In some cases there will even be games or other programs set up to be run from remote.

There are a great many programs legally available on BBSes, in three flavors. These are known as public domain, freeware and shareware. These are not interchangeable. Public domain programs have no owner. They have been released by their creators for use by anyone and may be used, copied and distributed by anyone. Freeware is almost the same thing: it can be freely used and copied for no charge, but the creators still hold the copyright. Shareware is software that can be freely copied and passed on but if you use it, you are expected to pay a small license fee on the honor system. Procomm, one of the better known communications programs, has been distributed as shareware as well as being bundled with several modems, though recently DataStorm Technologies has begun marketing Procomm Plus through regular retail outlets. Incidently, there are extensive BBS lists included as datafiles and dialing directories on the Procomm Plus disks. I was surprised (but not stunned) to see Meade Frierson, founding father and former President of the Southern Fandom Confederation, listed as contact for BBS information.

A small word of warning - there are some destructive, if clever, types out there who have created several types of programs with various hidden features that will do such things as format your hard drive unexpectedly. Recently so-called virus programs have appeared that modify certain system files on your disks in such a way that those files will then modify others. Know who you are dealing with and approach unknown

programs with care. Find a utility that will write-protect your hard drive before trying out unknown programs. Get a utility that will check for malicious DOS calls or messages such as "Gotcha!".

The main ourpose of BBSes is communications. There is a tremendous potential for exchange of all kinds of information nationwide over BBSes. There are even fannish boards (Here comes that Blatant Plug I warned you about earlier.) such as Milliways, the Restaurant at the End of the Universe. The Earth Node for the Restaurant/BBS is (912) 638-2909, serving fannish cuisine 24 hours per day. Parameters (here we go) 81N. at 300 and 1200 baud. I am expecting to expand the files available when the hard disk drive ordered from Aerocomp gets here (should be REAL SDON NOW). Files include Time Vortex OnLine with articles and stories from the marvelous zine Time Vortex. (Blatant Plugs sometimes come in pairs.) The Time Bubble being like it is some things will make it to the electronic version first while some things will make it to print first. Or vice versa. So discuss the matter over drinks and later the Universe will explode for your pleasure. (Wow! What kind of drinks do you serve in this place?)

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## Revised ByLaws Southern Fandom Confederation

SECTION 1. (a) The Southern Fandom Confederation is a nonprofit organization of, by and for science fiction and fantasy fans residing in the states of the Confederacy (Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia). existing for the purpose of promoting fan and professional activity within that area.

(b) The President shall have the discretion to name as "Southern Sympathizers" persons or groups outside the South for the purpose of membership and participation in the SFC.

SECTION 2. The SFC shall meet once a year, simultaneously and at the same place as the DeepSouthCon, hereafter DSC. This meeting shall be open to all dues-paid and dues-exempt SFC members, plus interested parties. Only dues-paid or -exempt members may speak or vote except through dispensation by the presiding officer. Each meeting shall consist of: (a) a review of the previous year's activity, (b) election of officers, and (c) suggestions from the membership for activities in the year ahead.

SECTION 3. The officers of the SFC shall consist of (a) a President, (b) a Vice President, (c) a Secretary-Treasurer, with duties as follows:

- (a) The President shall run the annual SFC business meeting, present a summary of the year's activities, set SFC policy on matters of controversy, publish the official SFC bulletin on a semi-annual basis, and represent the SFC at all fannish functions.
- (b) The Vice President shall serve in the place of the President should the President be absent.
- (c) the Secretary-Treasurer shall collect dues for the SFC, and maintain an account at a convenient bank on which only the Secretary-Treasurer or the President may draw; the Secretary-Treasurer, in conjunction with other officers, shall also maintain a file of all active Southern s.f. fans, amateur press alliances, fanzines, clubs and conventions. The Secretary-Treasurer is responsible for mailing the official bulletin at the cheapest possible rate.


All SFC officers must be residents in the Confederacy. All are elected to one-year terms, and may be elected to no more than five consecutive terms.

SECTION 4. Dues for the SFC are \$5.00 per year, a year being defined as the period between successive DeepSouthCons. The following are dues-exempt: (a) Winners of the Rebel Award presented at the DSC, (b) Individuals who have performed such service to the organization that the President feels they merit exemption, (c) SFC officers during their term of service.

SECTION 5. The official SFC bulletin shall be published on at least a semi-annual basis, though more often as finances permit. Each issue shall publish as comprehensive a list as possible of active Southern s.f. clubs, apas, and fanzines.

One issue each year shall publish a roster of dues-paid and exempt SFC members. Other contents shall be left to the discretion of the President, but shall revolve around Southern fandom's history, present activity, and future plans.

Editorial policy: (a) The bulletin shall concern itself freely with controversial matters confronting Southern Fandom. All editorial opinions shall be signed by the author and shall not be considered reflective of the opinions of any officer or the SFC itself. (b) The bulletin shall maintain a neutral position between and among competing bids for DSC, or between and among Southern contenders for a worldcon. (c) A letter column shall be printed in each issue containing a comprehensive spectrum of opinion on any matter before the SFC. (d) The SFC shall promote the candidacy of Southern fans and professionals for national honors such as the Hugo Awards. SECTION 6. This set of by-laws may be amended or replaced by the SFC members in attendance at the DSC meeting. Any amendment proposed in writing and signed by 20 or more SFC members must be brought before this meeting and voted upon. A majority of members at the meeting may cause an amendment to be brought to a vote. A 2/3 majority of members voting shall be sufficient to cause an amendment to pass. SECTION 7. All previous by-laws, rules and constitutions of the SFC are henceforth null and void.


