1993 SFC Business Meeting

The meeting opened at 11:50 AM on Sunday, June 6 with SFC President Sue Francis presiding.

- 1. Members voted to dispense with the reading of the minutes of the last meeting.
- 2. Treasurer's Report: Sue Francis informed us that the balance shown in the last SFC bulletin had increased by \$300.00, for a new total of \$750.00.
- 3. Bulk Mail Permit: We are checking into the cost of a Bulk Mail Permit and what the savings, if any would be.

We can't use someone else's imprint (like Atlanta's) unless the SFC bulletin is mailed from their post office and used their return address. (Note: Steve Francis has updated up the address list by utilizing returns from three previous first class mailings.)

- 4. Past bulletins: Steve Francis has accumulated an archive of SFC Bulletins. He will prepare a list of missing bulletins to be published in hopes of contributions to complete the archives.
- 5. SFC Patches: Sue Francis has ordered 220, the minimum order. The patches are now available for \$5.00 each, by mail or in person at any convention attended by a representative of the SFC. There will be no extra charge for patches purchased by mail.

6. New Business:

Amendment: It was proposed that we move to include Phoenix winners in Section 4(a). Wording to the effect that, "Winners of the Phoenix Award and Rebel Award..." are dues-exempt members of Southern Fandom Confederation will be added. The amendment was accepted by acclamation.



7. Results of elections:

Sue Francis informed us that J. R. Madden has decided not to stand for re-election as Secretary-Treasurer. There was a round of applause for J. R.'s hard work over these many years. The candidates were:

MidwestCon was, as usual, a relaxed, wonderful weekend party. It is held in Cincinnati, Ohio the last full weekend in June. On Saturday evening I had a party for Steve celebrating his 200th convention. Midwestcon had approximately 180 attendees.

RIYERCON

RiverCon XVIII was held at the Hurstbourne Hotel and Convention Center on August 6-8, 1993. There were about 850 attendees.

There were the usual happenings at RiverCon. A large dealers room, a great art show, gaming, 24-hour videos, filking, workshops, panels, and masquerade. We were even entertained by my beautiful grand-daughter, Melissa (age 6), who honored us with a dance to open the convention. There were a lot of parties held Friday night and Saturday afternoon and evening.

Among other activities, RiverCon had its first auction to benefit the Community Health Trust in Louisville, Kentucky. This organization helps people who are living with with AIDS/HIV who need help with insurance, medicine, a place to live and general information about AIDS awareness. RiverCon gave auction proceeds of over \$1600.00 to the organization. Our thanks go to all those who donated and purchased items.


CONFRANCISCO

We arrived in San Francisco on the Saturday before the convention, picked up our rental car and headed North to Chico, California (yes, there really is a town called Chico). Steve has family there and we were able to spend three days with them. Brian (Steve's youngest brother) drove down from Seattle, Washington. So all of his brothers and sisters were together for the first time in about 10 years. We had a great visit with family and then drove back down to San Francisco.

We checked into our hotel, unloaded luggage and then Steve returned the rental car while I unpacked. When Steve returned, we walked around the Moscone Convention Center area. We were delighted that we had decided to stay at the Marriott (even though it was not a "convention hotel"). It was as close to the convention center as the ANA hotel and was much closer by about three or four blocks than the other hotels. Most of the fans disliked the walk be-

cause of the number of homeless people that lined the streets. The homeless were not aggressive, but people felt bad because there was nothing that could be done for them. I know there are homeless people in all cities, but I have not seen so many in one place before.

On Wednesday we visited Fisherman's Wharf, Alcatraz Federal Prison, and discovered the wonderful sourdough bread bowls filled with clam chowder. MMMMMMMMM good. We rode a cable car back to the hotel. Wednesday evening we were able to get into the convention center and walked around to see where things were going to be. We went to dinner at Chevy's (a Mexican resturant).



Thursday was the beginning of the convention, and we walked over to the convention center with Dick Spelman, and Pat and Roger Sims to get registered. We found an extremely long line waiting for us. Little did we know that was just the beginning of standing in line.

Yes, I have worked on many conventions and I know the amount of work that goes into putting on a WorldCon. There are thousands and thousands of hours put into a WorldCon during the con. This does not even count the work done beforehand and afterwards, and it takes a lot of people. But there were a number of people that I talked to that had volunteered and never heard back from the convention organizers. I had volunteered to someone that asked me to work in her department and sent in a volunteer form. I was not later contacted by anyone, so I just went as an attendee. Registration would have been much better if they had given out the program book at the time you received your badge and pocket program. Because they had a limited number of freebies available, the decision was made to give tickets at the registration area and have people pick up their program book and freebies at another location. I don't know about evervone else, but I could have done without the freebies in order to save standing in another line.

There was a nice dealers' room with a lot of variety. The art show appeared to be on the small side, and I did not like the fact that the Artist Guest of Honor's art was hanging in the back of the room.

There was a display area for science fiction activity from all over the world. It was interesting to see fanzines from other countries. They had a display of WorldCon costumes and all of the seated WorldCons and WorldCon bids had tables in this area as well. I tried to attend opening ceremonies, but after standing in line for 1-1/2 hours before being seated. I was told that there would be at least another 45minute delay before they started, so we left. We went to the party hotel and checked out the bid parties that were open. We then went back to the Marriott Hotel and the CFG Suite. There was a great party there every night of the convention.

I attended all of the business meetings and spent a lot of time in the dealers' room. We did attend the Hugo ceremonies and send congratulations to all of the winners. Southerner Peggy Ranson won in the Fan Artist category, and for the second year in a row, Dick and Nicki Lynch won the Fanzine award. Laura Resnick won the Campbell Award and proud dad, Mike Resnick, accepted the award for her. We finished up the time with more sightseeing, having dinners with many fans, visiting old friends (Steve was raised in Oakland, California), and plain just having a good time. The 1994 worldcon will be in Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada.


In September we attended Contact, held at the Ramada Inn, and enjoyed visiting with friends in Evansville. They have a nice, friendly convention (especially the

I also found one of her comments interesting. "DeepSouthCon sounds like a very laid-back relaxa-con." I would like to ask her a direct question. Have you ever attended a DSC?

Her comment about people coming up and speaking with her is also interesting. Another question for Elizabeth. If you have attended a DSC, did you go to any room parties and speak to people? Southern fans are a friendly bunch, but if you don't make an effort to get to know us, then you will be left alone. We are too polite to kick down your door in order to meet you.

I do agree with her on one thing. DeepSouthCon is a reflection of Southern Fandom. We discussed this at the last BSFiC meeting, and the general feeling was that we are little less concerned with the programming aspects of a convention and a little more with the social aspects. We like to see our out-of-town friends, meet new friends and generally have a good time. We feel that this is enough of a difference to hold a con.

The bottom line is that if you don't like the way DSC's have been put together, get up a bid committee and bid for it. As a third-generation native Floridian, I would love to see DSC in central Florida. She is correct, there are several fine conventions held in her part of the state and there would be a great deal of interest across the region in a Florida DSC. For the record, no one has yet announced a bid for the 1996 DSC.

If bidding for a DSC is not her cup of tea, then that's fine, too. But don't criticize what you're not familiar with. Attend the 1994 DSC here in Birmingham. We might only have two tracks of programming, but we will have a video room and a well known guest of honor. We also have a lot of friendly people who will meet you halfway if you let them.
