# 1977: THE YEAR OF THE SOUTHERN CONVENTIONS

We use the term "conventions" or "cons" to refer to the weekerd-long gatherings of primarily sfaf fans, usually with a professional sf writer as guest of honor. To be sure, there are many minicons in the SFC area - one day gatherings to talk, see films, buy, sell and trade comics and books. For example, the quarterly congregating of 100 fans on a Sunday at the home of Ed Murray, 2540 Chapel Hill Rd, Durham NC 27707 or the Salem Parks & Recreation Comics-SF-Gum Card Trade held the first Saturday of each month at 620 Florida St Salem VA 24153. There are giant ST cons and smaller ones such as January 29-30 in Atlanta GA (too late for details here).

January - 7-9 - about 113 people gathered in Chattanooga TN for the second Chattacon under the able direction of Irvin Koch. There were no guests of honor but films, panels and parties as well as huckstering of sf and comics. Irvin plans on the same weekend for 1978 at a different motel.

Rock, Ark. was the first RCC-KON with pro guest Rock, Ark. was the first RCC-KON with pro guest Roger Zelazny and fan GoH Bob Asprin. Panels, trivia quiz, films, filksinging, banquet, parties, bheer and huckstering were planned by Margaret Middleton (4424 Bruno Rd, Little Rock Ark 72209). Next year, too?

KYian andrew j offutt is continuing his Cormac Mac Art series for Zebra Books. His sf-mystery novelet in STELLAR SHORT NOVELS (Ballantine books) has a character named Frierson. An interesting breef interview with him by Paul Dellinger, accomplished at Rivercon II, is published in the December 1976 JINNIA CLAN JOURNAL.

New writer Mary Schaub's "Serpentine", first published in the Elwood anthology SURVIVAL FROM IN-FINITY has been rendered in comic form in STAR-STREAM #2, one of the new 79¢ comics adapting some good sf (but, in my view, with less than striking artwork).

Gene Roddenberry appeared Dec. 10, 1976 before 14,000 at a Hollywood, FL sportsatorium for an evening "concert", so reports Peter Glaskowsky who runs a Miami ST club (13421 SW 69th Ct, zip 33156).

The same "World of Star Trek" presentation was in Jacksonville FL before about 7,000 "closet trekkers", reports Danny Quitter, head of STAR TREK SECTOR: JACKSONVILLE. He also reports that Roddenberry attended the regular club meeting at the local planetarium on December 18 the day before the performance. Danny is an announcer on station WAIV-FM and taped an interview with Roddenberry for broadcast.

Star Trek Sector: Jacksonville meets at 10 am at the Alexander Brest Planetarium, 1025 Gulf Life Drive within the Children's Museum, on the first and third Saturday of each month. The public - especially fans from other clubs and out-of-towners - are always welcome. Dues are \$6 per year or \$3 per half-year. They usually have posters, club T-shirts (with very distinctive club insignia) and other items to sell at meetings. On Feb. 5 they will see a free program at the planetarium and on the 19th a local psychic will talk about clairvoy-ance. Although our SFC publication dates of February and October (with newszine only to dues paid in June) do not afford a great deal of opportunity for ST cons to advertise here, we do try to stay in contact with all ST groups thru-out the area. At least there should be direct release of publicity between the addresses found in these pages and in the roster of fan addresses (where ST is added to names).

### THIS & THAT DEPT.

The University of Alabama Alumni News, Winter, 1976 issue contains a backoover plug for sf and a three page article on the subject based on an interview with Meade Frierson mentioned in Bull. 16.

The Memphis Sudday Supplement for November 14 contained a cover story by fan Dan Henderson on touring Memphis.

A California girl was upset enough at MidAmeriCon when a southern fan gestured at her with a small pocketknife (after she had been pestering people to buy buttons for some good cause or other) (1) look him up later and hit him and (2) bad-mouth southern fandom and (3) write a letter suggesting that if there cannot be peace and trust and sanity between fans at cons, then we are no better than society "outside". It was a minor thing but she did have a good point - our conduct at cons between ourselves as well as hotel management etc. should be a matter of pride to each of us attending. We are more of a family than the rest of the world and should conduct ourselves accordingly (whereupon the thin slats of his soapbox cracked and he shut up) .

A project has been suggested for non-Star Trek sf fans. This is to notify the TV networks of our desire to see some quality of programming. They have received enough Star Trek letters and it is suggested that that show not be mentioned in the letters but that it be pointed out to the nets how much marketing the movies and paperbacks are doing in the sf area and that the nets are way behind. They should be assured of the wealth of easily adapted material available and the salent and accessibility of writers who could effectively present sf stories while working within production budgets. Letters should be addressed to TV programming in New York, NY 10019 at these addresses: ABC - 1330 Avenue of the Americas; CBS = 51 West 52nd; and NBC - 30 Rockefeller Plaza. Our source indicates that they are very close to some decent programming and this kind of nudge may well help.

A propos of the above, Chuck Raue of Mobile (see "ST Developments") mentions the questionnable future of the syndicated TV show "SPACE: 1999" is in the balance now. He encourages a letter campaign to Independent Television Corp, 555 Madison Av, NYC 10022 urging the show's continuation. Despite its shortcomings in the minds of many, the show's demise could very well hurt chances for any sf on TV for an indefinite period.

Meade Frierson III will be Fan Guest of Honor at Balticon XI in Baltimore MD, April 8-10, 1977 - advance memberships of \$4 may be sent to Martin E. Deutsch, 6135 Waterloo Rd, Ellicott City MD 21043 (other guests: Phil Farmer, Norman Spinrad, Chip Delany, and Rick Sternbach).

Meade Frierson III will also be Fan Guest of Honor (this is getting ridiculous, folks) at Windycon held in Chicago in late September-early October. Details available at a later date.

At DSC 77 in Birmingham there will be the annual SFC Business Meeting and also bidding for the site of the 1978 DeepSouthCon. The announced contenders to date are the Lynches of Chattanooga TN who want "Dixiecon 78" there September 29-October 1 and Lon Atkins and Dave Hulan (actifans from AL displaced to California for the last decade) who want to hold the DSC nearer to the 1978 worldcon in Phoenix, namely, they want it at South Coast, CA the weekend before worldcon.

In an effort to bring all the news of fans of all kinds here in the SFC area, we combed the pages of the recent THE BUYER'S GUIDE FOR COMIC FANDOM \$167 (which sells from 50¢, 12/\$3 or 26/\$5 from 15800 Rt.84 North, East Moline IL 61244) to see what has been happening here.

We find a big ad for Music City Comics in Nashville (2700 Murfreesboro Rd, Antioch 37013).

We learned that Steve Leaf (1776 Helen Dr. Atlanta GA 30306) and Dee Sharpe (1992 McJenkins Dr. ATL GA 30345) were behind the mini-con ithere January 29-30.

We also find that Scott Tillman, as Ascot Pubs, 2410 Wensley, Charlotte NC 28219 publishes a comics newsletter for 25¢ plus 13¢ stamp.

Also we bearn that there was a mini-con in Charlotte NC January 16 and there may be more. Contact H. Shelton Drum, POB 848, Newton NC.

ally, SFC member Harry A. Hopkins, PSC Box 1033, Shaw AFB, SC 29152 offers more info for a 13¢ stamp on the International Fandom Inflation Control Club for comics trading.

Film collecting buffs are doubtless aware of a publication in our area which I only recently obtained. THE BIG REEL is published monthly by Don Key, POB 275, Summerfield NC 27358 for \$12.50/yr. It contains articles and trade and sales lists for super 3mm sound and 15mm sound films for home use only. I saw ads in the Janaury issue for THE DAY THE EARTH STOOD STILL, some TWLIGHT ZONE shows and COLOSSUS.

At least two southern dealers find display of their wares, mainly books and pulps, in XENOPHILE which is available for \$8 per year 3d class or \$12 lst class from Nils Hardin, POB 9660, St Louis MO 63122. It is a monthly "advertiser and journal devoted to fantastic and imaginative literature." There are checklists, indexes, reviews in addition to ads for pulps and such.

SPECIAL APPRECIATION THIS ISSUE goes to Ken and Lou Moore for giving 40 or so southern fans a much needed relaxacon (called Kookakhan) in Nashville in early December. I personally would not have been able to make it thru a busy December without this respite and I think everyone there enjoyed the

games, TV shows, talk and especially the SMOFing (to the uninitiate, that means pretending one is the Secret Master of Fandom and "solving all the problems of the world" and suchlike).

Lou also did us a service by selling SFC emblems to the Nashville fans at club meetings last year.

appreciation, as should be evident by a flyer in this issue, goes to Cliff Amos as well as the Moores for becoming a focal point to impact on national fandom, as Southern Fandom has been somewhat slow to do. (As one or two - Hi, Cliff - have mentioned it, let me amplify a passing remark in Bulletin 16 about Rivercon as a southern con. It is a southern con, run by southern congoing cons-fans like Cliff, Bob Roehm, the Francises, &c, no doubt of it. But one is more likely to encounter non-SFC fans because of its accessibility to the active, con-going Midwestsf fandom. I was only pointing out that cons which look exclusively to the southern fans because of their location have a tougher time financially, and Cliff doesn't dispute that).

A National SF convention in Louisville, or Nashville when facilities permit, can lead to the kind of worldcon that southern fans have needed to present to the rest of the world since 1951. And we all know the convention center of the South is Atlanta.







1979 North American Science Fiction Convention


Under the rotation system established by the Constitution of the World Science Fiction Society, the 1979 world convention is open to bids from the Central Division of North America. However, there is a strong overseas bid from Brighton, England, for that year. Should the British bid win, a Central Division site is entitled to host a North American Continental Convention (see box at right). The Louisville in '79 committee is bidding for that Continental Convention.
