Dues-paid or dues-exempt members will receive the pre-convention mailing in June, 1979 - to determine if you are dues-paid or dues-exempt consult the listing on page 4.

Contributions to the cause are always welcome.

A new copy of the HANDBOOK costs 40¢ third class mail but we try to maintain a supply through local clubs, so please check there first.

SOUTHERN CONVENTIONS - PAST AND FUTURE

Halfacon '79 (Dec. 8-10, 1978) - was an inspiration of Don Markstein, aided by Curt Stubbs, to displace a southern party-con to a western ghost town, Bisbee AZ. None of the Guests, Charles G. Finney, Jim Corrick or Halfacon Founder Allen Green field, showed up nor did the film program, but we are certain that the handful of fansine fans who gathered there had a memorable party.

Chattacon 4 (Jan. 5-7, 1979) - was the largest sf con held in TN to date by virtue of its 436 attendees - video programming was interesting but crowded. Featured speaker Alan Dean Foster was an admirable guest and Master of Ceremonies Cliff Amos conducted discussion of the black arts. Toastmaster Wilson Tucker is as ever a fine addition to any con. The Program Book featured a splendid review of TN-cons by Cliff Amos. Con reports may be found in Feb CHAT and Jan ATARANTES. There was a fine artshow and masquerade and the pleasant mixture of new and old fans.

Roc * Kon 3 (Feb. 9-11, 1979) - CHAT reports lower attendance of 171 because of foul weather. Attending pros were GoH Kelly Freas, Gordon Dickson and Robert Asprin. Fan GoH Shelby Bush had to fly in. Jack Chalker and Wilson Tucker were unable to attend. The weather has provoked a change in this annual Feb con (see below).

CoastCon 79 (Mar. 9-11, 1979) - Biloxi hosted about 350 in the second con held in the flood Buena Vista Hotel. A non-stop excellent movie program and wargamers in abundance were the principal features. GoH George RR Martin fully participated in all other program items; Gale Burnick, Meade and Penny Frierson were basically the balance of the light programming. Mike Weber won the trivia contest; Lou Zocchi brought back vaudeville to the con banquet (and seemed right in place in the hotel). George Alec Effinger was in hospital (best wishes, ol' Piglet). There was an L-5 presentation by Micky McWilliams and local astronomer James McMurtry gave a space talk. The committee worked hard and avoided disasters and is to be highly commended in all respects except the limited use of a con suite (unavoidable with such a high film budget).

OrangeCon 79 (Mar. 30-31) - no reports from this one.

DeepSouthCon 79 is the 17th annual convention, this year hosted by The Sons of the Sand in NEW ORLEANS LA on July 20-22. GoH is Ray Lafferty; other guests Jo Clayton, "Piglet" Effinger, Joe Green, Roger Lovin, Kenneth Smith, Hank Stine, and Karl Edward Wagner. MC is Jerry Page. Annual SFC Meeting and an unusual film program. Le Pavillon Hotel - \$30 single, \$38 double. Special chapbook will honor Lafferty. Rivercon will not be held this year in LOUISVILLE KY because the committee which has presented the first four cons is pre-occupied with the biggest event in SFC-land since 1951:

APA UPDATE

The Southern Fandom Press Alliance (SFPA) is still going strong under the leadership of OE Alan Hutchinson, 2833 36th Av No. St. Petersburg FL 33713. There are 30 members and 19 in the waiting lines. Dues are \$3 per year and limited numbers of extra copies of the mailings are sold for \$2. #87 (January 1979) contained 34 zines totalling 271 pages.

Myriad is headed by OE Cecil W Hutto, 104 Filmore Rd, Monroe LA 71203. It has 19 members and a waiting list of 9 who were invited to join. Dues are \$3 per year. #77 contained 149 pages in 20 zines.

Spectator Amateur Press Society (SAPS) is open to new members who will send in the \$2 dues and 35 identical copies of 6 pages of material for the April 15, 1979 mailing (or July 15 after that). 15 members have been producing about 80 pages and there are sample past mailings available from Meade Frierson, 3705 Woodvale Rd, Birmingham, AL 35223, the OE (Nicki Lynch is nominated to run the apa in 1980).

The newest apa in the area has been announced to begin June 1. It is for (video)tapers and typers - fans who have both a video cassette recorder and can type their material for the bi-monthly mailings. This is not the same organization which was censored from Bulletin 20. Membership is limited to 30 and numerous fans have expressed interest so please send an SASE today for details to Meade Frierson PCB 9032, Birmingham AL 35213. The idea is to promote trading of TV and HBO shows between fans and also discuss equipment and everything else. The name is APA-VCR and before Ken Moore can mispronounce it, we have an official mispronunciation, Ah-PAV-cur.

There are few indeed of the 84 drawings from Astounding in the Fifties (\$12.95). A home is not a fanish home without a Freas; Kelly and Polly are institutions in SFC-land.

ATARANTES - is the monthly newsletter of the Atlanta Science Fiction Club published by Cliff Biggers, 1029 Franklin Rd 3A, Marietta GA 30067, free to members, 12 for \$3.50 or The Usual - Cliff has great pro news sources which makes this much more than a club newsletter. Astute readers will notice that much of our news here is courtesy of Cliff and ATARANTES.

CHAT - monthly publication of the Chattanooga SF Association, published by Dick & Nicki Lynch, 4207 Davis Ln, CHAT TN 37416 is available for membership in CSFA, 3 for \$1 or ?? It has been running more artwork than most clubzines and has featured sf author interviews, reviews and letters.

The Iron Baron - is not strictly a clubzine but is put out by Birmingham, AL SCA fans and published and distributed by sf fan Charlotte Proctor, 8325-7th Av So, BHM AL 35206.

Jambalaya - started to be a newszine from New Orleans, in fact, from new mother Dana Adams Longo. Terms were 5 for \$1 or The Usual. We haven't seen any 1979 issues, however. Inquiry of Dana at 6221 Wadsworth Dr, NO LA 70122.

SMART-ASH is the zine and newsletter of Chimneyville F&SF Society, POB 10895, Jackson MS 39309. Available for trade or contribs or 50¢ and SASE per copy. Quite a mixed bag.

Baryon - a reviewzine (with letters) from Barry Hunter, 8 Wakefield Place, Rome GA 30151. #13 was 16 pp, #14 was 18pp. \$1 each or subs of 6 for \$5, also trade or accepted contribution.

Cullowhee Comments - an irregular publication of Richard Llewellyn, PO Drawer 87, Cullowhee NC 28721. Available for \$0.50 or the Usual. #3 was 35¢ and 10 pp; #4 was 20pp. Has the general fanzine content.

Fannhistorica - is an irregular fanzine emphasizing the fannish past. #8 (August, 1978) was \$1 from Joe D Siclari, 2201 N.E. 45th St, Lighthouse Point FL 33064. 58 pp mimeo.

Fantasy Film Journal #2 - from Thomas A. Johnson, 200 So. Cox Memphis TN 38118 is a beautifully printed film journal, 56 pages, \$3.00. Lavishly illustrated with photos and drawings. Articles deal with Harryhausen (an interview), and recent fantasyfilms. One of the most impressive publications in the fannish south.

Fanzine Directory #2 - is what it says it is from ex-KY Allan Beatty, POB 1040, Ames IA 50010, a 20 page reduced-type compendium of fanzines. \$1. He uses a standard for classification of a fanzine ascribed to Don Markstein: "A fanzine is a magazine I get in the mail in trade for my fanzine." Sure.

Florida Fandom - Rick and Ruth Coy have announced a CoA to 520 South "D" St, Lake Worth FL 33460 and a delay in the next issue until April (from Feb).

Future Retrospective - is a large reviewzine published by Cliff Biggers, and Susan Biggers, 1029 Franklin Rd #3-A, Marietta GA 30067 for subs of 4 for \$3 or 6 for \$4.50. The 48 page double issue, #15-16, published in January 1979 was \$1, reviewed 67 books and contained columns by others, too.

Galactic Outpost, 40pp, \$1 from Hands in the Dark, POB 680488 Miami FL 33168 deals mostly with comics, fantasy and SF.

Galactic Traveler - is a quarterly fanzine "with a Star Trek nature that follows other areas of science fiction," from Rob Richardson, 6509 Creekwood Ct, Mobile AL 36609. Subs are 4 issues for \$2.50. Most of #2 (December 1978) was an ST story by Lucy Lunt.

The Hippogriff - is a 22 page zine from the Chimneyville SF group, \$0.75 or the Usual from POB 10895, Jackson MS 39209. A general zine from this new and active group.

The Liberated Quark - continues "now and again" from HaRoSFA, (George Beahm was editor for #6) but there is no address for the issue. Very impressive one it is, too, check with M.E. Tyrrell (under Clubs).

Lift Off - is an offset zine from Perry Glen Moore, 1326 Burton Valley Rd, Nashville TN 37215. #4 (October 1978) was 16pp of LoCs, reviews, and articles. The issue was \$1. #5 in Jan was to contain the results of a reader survey.

The Many Worlds of Jack Vance - #2 is \$3 for 64 pp offset with such Rod Whigham fantasy art, a Jack Vance short story, and graphic adaptations with edited text of Vance's Eyes of the Overworld. Impressive fantasy work.

Maybe - Irvin Koch's distinctively cluttered zine is less frequent than in the past but more busy. #51 was his 9th anniversary issue. He says he mails by whim but \$1 has been known to persuade his whim in your direction. There is more and more NFFF business in there.

Panazine #2 - from Robert Teague, 1900 Okay Av, Panama City FL 32405 is still a pretty slim zine. Nothing further seen since September 1978.

Rally #39-41 perks along from Don Markstein, 8208 E. Vista, Scottsdale AZ 85253, if, as and when. Funny if you get it and you can try (at 4 for a \$1 if not trade or news).

Riverside Quarterly - more infrequent than in the past (#24 was December 1977), Leland Sapiro, POB 14451, Univ Sta, Gainesville FL 32604 puts out a high calibre sf mag. 4 for \$3.

Slower Than Infinity - an interesting little zine which looks like Maybe's sibling in layout. #3 was 24 pp halfsize and #4 was 28pp. Clinton Hyde, 420 E. Roanoke St, Blacksburg VA 24060 hid his price somewhere; he had fun with it

PROGRESS REPORT NUMBER 2

The Deep South Con is the largest annual regional Southern convention. Sponsored by the Southern Fandom Confederation, a truly Southern group, it is a truly Southern convention. Fandom gathers together for the Southern hospitality and good ol' down home partying they have come to expect from the DSC. Last year, in Atlanta, the convention numbered over 700 fans from nearly every state in the union. This year, come to New Orleans. The Sons of the Sands, one of New Orleans' oldest fan groups, are hosting the third New Orleans DSC. We think it will be the best.

The hotel selected for this year's Con is Le Pavillion. Le Pavillion is a luxury hotel located in the heart of down town, eight blocks from Canal Street, and on the other side of Canal Street is the FRENCH QUARTER!!! It's all just a few blocks away — and we don't mean long ones. Within a ten block radius are: the Greyhound station, the Continental Trailways station, the express bus to the airport, the Amtrack station and the interstate.

Also, restaurants to fit EVERY pocketbook and taste, several open all night. All night bars, too! (Minimum drinking age 18.) The hotel itself has several fine food and drink establishments within its walls if you'd prefer not to leave. Le Pavillion is slightly more expensive than your average Howard Johnson's — \$30 single (which all have double beds) and \$38 double (two double beds), but it's gorgeous: not too small, not too big, and very luxurious. We bargained them down from \$50 and \$60 because July is slow in New Orleans — which means we'll practically have the hotel to ourselves. You can enjoy the deep carpets, crystal chandeliers and French Empire furniture without funny looks from the D.A.R. or the V.F.W. We are attempting to distribute reservation cards with every flyer, but if you don't have one, write: Le Pavillion Hotel, 833 Poydras Street, New Orleans, LA 70112. Mention our convention.

There are several DSC traditions which no DSC would be complete without: the Hearts Tournament, for example. We have a prize for this year's winner, who may or may not be Hank Reinhart. Traditionally, the DSC has a Saturday night banquet, where the coveted Rebel (for distinguished service to Southern fandom) and Phoenix (for a distinguished Southern science fiction writer) are awarded. Gumbo will be served, as well as other delicious New Orleans dishes. Vegetarian and Kosher meals will be available, too. Please let us know immediately if you will attend the banquet, and if you require a special meal. Other DSC fannish traditions we will carry on are: the 24-hour hospitality suite, with beer and cold drinks in the bathtub; the fanzine room; the art show; and the annual reading of the world's worst science fiction (bring your favorites). Some special New Orleans additions will be: a live jazz band costume ball (with prizes: Friday night; costumes optional but appreciated); all night movies; and an L-5 society Space Academy. Since the convention coincides with the tenth anniversary of the Apollo 11 lunar landing, we are negotiating with NASA for special exhibits. Other program items include: a science-fiction writing workshop conducted by Hank Stine, editor of Galaxy magazine; a special slide show and lecture on fantasy art by world-renowned fantasy photographer Clarence J. Laughlin; a panel on selling science-fiction writing; a lecture on the Space Age, its past and future, by Joe Green; and others still nebulous but sure to coalesce by contime. One innovation we hope to implement is a variation on the trivia contest: the Trivia Bowl. Since fans pride themselves on their breadth of knowledge, here is a chance to show off. It will be team competition, but if you don't have a team we'll try to put one together for you. The questions will cover science-fiction, as well as the trivial in general. We think it sounds like fun.

The movies are what experienced DSC-goers expect from the Sons of the Sands: the unexpected. We plan to show movies you aren't likely to see on TV or catch at any other con, movies that, alone, are worth the membership fee. In addition, we will have video tapes of science-fiction blockbusters, a Max Fleischer Superman cartoon festival, Betty Boop cartoons, and homemade fan s.f. movies. Bring your own: we project in 16, regular 8 and super 8.
