SCUTHERN WORLDCON BID IS LAUNCHED FOR 1986!

One of the constitutional purposes of S.F.C. is to support the groups which may hold world science fiction society conventions over Labor Day Weekend in the South. The last one which was run by southern fans was put on in 1950 in New Orleans (FL was the site of the 1977 worldcon - southern fans worked at it but were not active in the bid or policymaking).

At Chicago in September, 1982 the site of the 1984 west coast worldcon will be chosen and at that convention the eastern zone site will be chosen. After much conversation about an Atlanta bid for 1986, a committee has been formed to start the campaign.

\$3 or \$5 to the committee at PO Box 10094, Atlanta GA 30319 is solicited as pre-supporting memberships (\$5 gets direct mailing of the progress reports on the bid as issued). The Committee names released last year are: Randy Satterfield (GA), Jim Gilpatrick (NJ, ex-AL); Cliff Amos (KY); Ward Batty (GA), Cliff Biggers (GA), Susan Biggers (GA), Iris Brown (GA), Dan Caldwell (TN), Avery Davis (GA), Dick Lynch (TN), Nicki Lynch (TN), Brad Linaweaver (GA), Irvin Koch (TN-GA), Sue Phillips (GA), Mike Weber (GA), John Whitley (GA), and Ron Zukowski (GA). The Atlanta Hilton and its environs (one block each direction) can certainly hold the most enormous of conventions - 3 blocks to the Civic Center for major program items like the Hugo presentations will present minimal problems. The main hotel would have 1000 rooms by 1986.

Support for the bid can take many different forms - buttons and T-shirts will not only provide some funds to the bids but will publicize it when you wear them around to different conventions. Mention of your support in the fanzines you publish, letters of comment that you write, and club meetings you attend will help. Basically, it comes down to voting which, as I said, is done at the 1984 convention which many of us near Atlanta will not be attending - voting will be open only to members of the 1984 convention so it will be important to secure supporting memberships in the 1984 worldcon (to vote for the Hugos and, with supporting membership paid, for Atlanta in 1986).

When it comes to paying money in support, consider what you would pay to travel from where you are to Atlanta's adversary (whatever it may be). It's smart for all Southerners to support the convenient, and extremely competent, Atlanta worldcon bid!

Nicki Lynch reported that Charlie Williams, Knoxville TN fan and artist, barely missed the Hugo nomination for his 1980 work product in fanzines, flyers, etc. Members of the 1982 Chicago world sf convention will be able to nominate their favorite fan artists on the basis of 1981 work in a month or so. I strongly urge that Charlie Williams be seriously considered for a high spot on your ballot...and that is not just because he furnished the attractive variation on the SFC logo which appears at the left or because some call him the cement of Knoxville fandom or because he's a helluvaguy or because... but rather because his sometimes-funny, sometimes-breathtaking but always interesting artwork has been generously bestowed on the fan press in lavish abundance during this past year in particular.

UpperSouthClave XII - March 5-7, 1982 at Park Mammoth Resort, Park City KY. This is the third ConCave sponsored by the Bowling Green KY fans and honors TN-fan Irvin Koch this time. There will be a con suite with free beverages (typically of the regular and relaxacons), indoor pool, huckster room, art show & auction, some films and games. \$6.50 to 2/14, then \$8 to Box U-122, College Hts Sta, Bowling Green KY 42101. 1981 Convention Wrap-up (in brief)

Since the Friersons did not personally attend any 1981 cons except Kubla and the DSC, the Bulletin is dependent on reports from others to reconstruct the past history of an extremely active 1981 convention season in the SFCLand.

Stone Hill Launch II was held February 14, 1981 at the University of South Florida in Tampa sponsored by the Stone Hill SFA. Between 250-300 FL fans attended. GoH was Richard Louis Newman, a Tampa pro-writer who spoke on SF book writing and getting published. Pro-artist Susan Parham displayed her paintings. Other events were costume competition with 25 entrants, D&D, alien cooking demonstration, video room, filksinging, amateur films and the debut issue of the Stone Hill fanzine. (Thanks to Richard Louis Newman)

Stellarcon VI took place February 27-March 1, 1981 with guests Gordon Dickson (reading from the Final Encyclopedia), Kelly Freas, Robert Asprin, George Takei, M.A. Foster, Robert Adams, Dick Preston and cartoonist Ken Mitchroney. There were 500 members, largely because the UNC-Greensboro students were admitted free. There was a varied film program, good art show and masquerade, "a manic masterpiece called 'SomaVision' conceived by Richard Edwards", and several entertaining and informative lectures and panel discussions. (Thanks to Mary A. Carson).

Fan-Con I was on March 6-8, 1981 with around 90 registered and took place at the Ramada Inn in Panama City FL. The guest speaker, Irv Lipscomb of Tallahassee, was interesting and brought a slide show on the fr "Remake of Rocketship X-M" as well as a copy of the original classic. The con was small but well-organized with video room, costume contest (12 entrants), small art show, good film schedule, small-but-diverse hucksters room Sat. night banquet, helpful program book. (Thanks to R.Teague).

CoastCon '81 on March 13-15, 1981 at a reasonably priced hotel in Biloxi MS featured Jerry Pournelle, Richard & Wendy Pini, Jo Clayton and George Alec Effinger - 24 hour films and video, lots of gaming. It sounds like a fun time.

UpperSouthClave XI on March 13-15, 1981 at the Red Carpet Inn in Bowling Green KY was the second relaxacon, yeapt ConCave 2, with fan guests Ken and Lou Moore about whom speeches were made at the banquet. There was an attendance of 150 and "the art show sold about \$700 worth of art which is incredible considering that most of the items sold were low priced and for minimum bid. The costume party had a good attendance with many people dancing (of course, Cliff [Amos] was there in his special costume)." (Thanks to Rickey Sheppard).

Satyricon on April 3-5, 1981 at the Ramada Inn West in Knoxville TN drew 405 for GoH Gordon Dickson, Fan GoH Guy H. Lillian of SFPA, Stan Schmidt, Karl Edward Wagner, Jerry Page with Andrew J. Offutt as MC. The consuite was well-run and featured the Chattacon 6 masquerade videotape at the dead dog party on Sun. In addition to films and video, the con was notable for its excellent artshow with many new talented local artists on display. The huckster room had 45 tables and quite a variety of material. Big event for apa fans was the 100th mailing of SFPA (see section on apa below) which accounted for some out-of-area visitors. (Thanks to Chattacon, via Irv Koch). There was talk of another but no hard news.

Kubla Khan 9 - A new hotel (first and last time there by mutual agreement) with pluses-and-minuses but the spirit of Kubla persevered with GoH Charles Grant, MC Andrew J. Offutt and Frank R. Paul award artist Jack Caughan. Alan Ryan and several pros showed up. My notes are lost but there was good art (as usual) hospitably large con suites, films and video. The dates were May 8-10, 1981 (an eternity ago).

Swampcon II - on May 23, 1981 at James Fadden's house in Baton Rouge LA. "Jo Clayton was our GoH with George Alec Effinger as the Associate GoH...this may have been the first tiny con that they had ever been to, but Jo said that she had a great time and felt that there was a need for more smaller cons like this one in the future." There were 38-40 fans from New Orleans, Lafayette and Vivian LA and Jackson MS. It apparently had all the features of a regular con but in miniature, of course. The banquet was Clay Fourrier's spaghetti feast.

ABCCon II was held in Rome GA June 27-28, 1981 and Iris Brown reported that the relaxacon drew about 50 people, almost broke even and encourages her to consider doing another Rome half-a-con (see above). Frank Love ran a slide show about the Birmingham club, there was a hearts tourney, swimming pool and "extremely well-stocked con suite, offering all members far more than their \$2 should have led them to expect." (Thanks to Atarantes #49).

Southern Con 2 was held at the Hyatt Regency in Nashville TN on July 3-5, 1981 with celebrities Patrick Stuart, Dirk Benedict.

Mysticon 1 1/2 was held at the Jefferson Inn in Roanoke VA on July 3-5, 1981 with GoH Somtow Sucharitkul and Jerry Page, M.A. Foster, Ralph Roberts, Jack & Eva Chalker under the sponsorship of the Nelson Bond Society, PO Box 1362, Salem VA 24153.

Atlanta Comics and Fantasy Fair took place at the Dunfey Hotel in Atlanta GA on July 24-26 with guests Richard Matheson, Michael Whelan, Jim Starlin, Al Williamson and Charles Lippincott.

Rivercon VI was held at the Galt House in Louisville KY on July 24-26, 1981 with GoH Jack Williamson, Fan GoHs Mike & Carol Resnick and Toastmaster Frank M. Robinson. The large huckster room (75 tables), film & video programming, riverboat ride, banquet, masquerade, and con suite all helped entertain the 780 members of the convention.

Space: 1999 Con 4 was held at the Sheraton Airport Inn in the Atlanta GA area on August 7-9, 1981 with TV show episodes, costume contest, amateur films and memorabilia auction as events. For future plans, try inquiring (with SASE) to International Alliance, 86 First St., New London OH 44851 or Juanita Cunningham at 912-923-2886.

Vul-Con VIII was held on August 14-16, 1981 at the Airport Hilton Hotel in Kenner LA. The guests were Paula Crist, Joe Green, Jack Stocker, W. McAllister, Jo Clayton and George Alec Effinger.

B'hamaCon II was the 19th annual DeepSouthCon and held in Birmingham AL's Hilton Convention Center under the auspices of Jim Gilpatrick and the BSFC on August 28-30, 1981. About 320 attended. GoH was Ireland's Bob Shaw, MC was Jerry Page and Fan GoH was Hank Reinhardt. A new award debuted there (see section on apas below) and the traditional awards were the Phoenix to Mary Elizabeth Counselman and the Rebel to Dick and Nicki Lynch. Lon Atkins became Hearts Champion of the Known Universe (until his rematch with Reinhardt next June). SFC elections took place (see final pages). (Thanks to the Lynchi)

Imagicon 2 was held at the Holiday Inn Overton Square in Memphis TN on September 25-27. "On the whole the con went well with no major foul-ups and fair good hotel relations. We had approx. 150 in attendance which was almost enough to break even. Andy & Jody Offutt were great and Charlie Williams was tremendously entertaining as Fan GoH. As usual, Sidney Jones and Steve Williams did a superlative job with the video room. The maskeraid was between Panther Burns sets with DeDe Bass winning best costume by popular acclaim...an assassin's bureau was established during the con, so throughout the con deadly combat was waged with rubber dirks and water-pistols." (Thanks to Memphen #46)

ruid Con II was held on September 26, 1981 at the University of Alabama with an all-night party suite at a local hotel. The banquet was at a Chinese restaurant, there was a video room, dealer's room, D&D tournament, wargaming room, SCA display and time machine, apparently, because they claimed to have as of "thirty-five year old Hank 'Henry' Reinhardt, the fearsome, fantastic and virilily senile Atlanta fan..." Elsewhere, he was referred to as "King of Hearts" which seems more likely.

lacticon '81 took place September 25-27 at the Daytona Beach Resort Inn in D.B., FL with featured speaker Joe Haldeman, MC by Haldeman, Pro artist C.C. Beck, Fan Artist Ken Mitchroney, Fan GoH Rusty Hevelin, and guest authors Joe Green, Richard L. Whman and Warren Salomon.

Port City Con 1 took place on October 2-4, 1981 in Mobile AL at the Econo Lodge Hotel. "It turned out to be quite a bit smaller than expected and was a very relaxed, laid-back affair with the guests. Don Clut, Wilson Tucker, and David Kyle, very much in evidence. The film program was diverse as was the huckster room...everyone (to my knowledge) had a great time." (Thanks to Transmissions #93.)

1981 Con Reports continued

RoVaCon 6 was held on October 2-4 at Northside High School in Roanoke VA. GoH was Algis Budrys with special guests James Tiptree, Jr. and Kelly Freas and featured guests Paul Dellinger, John Broderick, Richard & Janice Preston, and Ralph Roberts. Memberships rose after long period of anti-inflation to \$5 at the door and many attended. Awards distributed were the memorial scholarship in the Handbook, a Freas scholarship for art, a Liz Taylor scholarship for dramatics and the F RoVa for contribution to SF&F.

Tallycon 1 took place on October 9-11, 1981 in the Tallahassee FL Civic Center and nearby hotels. Pros in attendance were Robert Adams, Ben Bova, Richard & Wendy Pini, Kelly & Polly Freas, and Wilson Tucker. The con has been proclaimed a critical, if not financial, success, by several sources. A repeat is expected in February 1983.

RockKon 6 featured GoH Fred Saberhagen, Fan GoH Marty Burke and Toastmaster Bob Asprin at the Sam Peck in Little Rock AR on October 16-18, 1981.

Asheville Mini-con was held on Sat., October 17 in the Holiday Inn West, Asheville NC with Ralph Roberts, Phil Hawkins, Butch Guice, and other guests. It was also called Skycon 1.5 by D.W. Howard, its sponsor.

ASFiCon 2 was held on October 23-25, 1981 at the Northlake Hilton outside Atlanta GA. Robert Silverberg was GoH and Mike Bishop, MC. Joe D. Siclari was Fan GoH. Other pros in attendance were Hank Reinhardt, Jerry Page, Sharon Webb, George Alec Effinger, John M. Ford, Ralph Roberts, and Brad Linaweaver. "Some of the convention highlights included phone interviews with non-attending writers by Brad, the artists' panel, well-attended masquerade, and ubiquitous Hearts Tournament (won by Steven Carlberg). Banquet and artshow were weak points. Attendance was over 500, including 100 one-day members. "Programming was widely varied with at least two different things going on at the con 24 hours a day, and 3 or 4m tracks of programming occurring during the afternoons...breaking the recent trend in Southern conventions, the con broke even." (Thanks to Film at Eleven #2 and Atarantes #53).

Sci-Con 3 was held November 6-8, 1981 at Sheraton Beach Inn in Virginia Beach VA with GoH Robert Asprin, special guest Kelly Freas, and artists Rowena Morrill and Barbi Johnson. The final con chairman was Mark Vittorini after several changes of emphasis seem to have taken place. Widespread advertising was curtailed at one point in favor of a relaxacon.

Zer-con was held on November 21, 1981 at the King's Inn in Huntsville AL under sponsorship of The North Alabama SF Association. They had con suite, game room, video room and the world's largest diplomacy game board. One presumes it was a dress rehearsal for the club's 1982 con.

Concave 2.5 or Halfacon '81 would wrap up the year on December 4-6 at Park City KY as a traditional relaxacon at the site of the March USC XII.

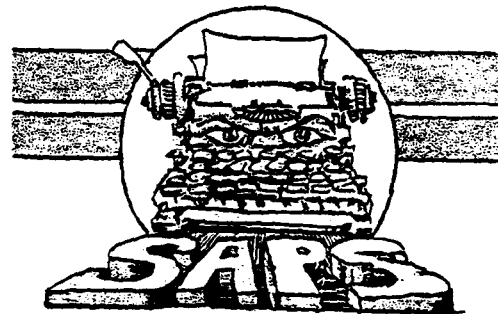

Atarantes #55 - this more-than-a-clubzine is the official ASFIC fanzine with club announcements of forthcoming events and reporting of those of the past and new members and other business. But it presents, in addition, entertaining art, stimulating letters, broader-interest news, and with co-editor Ward Batty, Cliff Biggers has a new feature of fanzine reviews which is top-drawer. Guest columns of late have been by John Whitley on Horror & Supernatural, Brad Linaweaver on bad films, Ralph Roberts, Andrew Offutt, Gerald Page, etc. To quote from its logo: "Subscriptions 12/\$6 or available for The Usual. It's yet another Neat Publication: Deserving Your Hugo Nomination!" Amen. Contact Cliff Biggers, 6045 Summit Wood Drive, Kennesaw GA 30144-24, games of Pac-Man couldn't be as much fun! With the demise of CHAT and the changing nature/personnel of Anvil, the moribundity of FOSFAX and Liberated Quark, we enter 1982 with lots of SF (strictly) clubs and one super publication none else approach as a traditional/balanced fanzine. Let At serve as your model/inspiration, folks, and display your talent.

From Atarantes #52 comes this edition of a review of a new clubzine, Hard Knox #1 (which debuted at KublaKhan 1981): \$1 from KSFF, 4314 Hayes Av, KMX TN 37912, 12 pp. "Most of the KMX fans are artists, so editors Deb Hammer-Johnson and Charlie Williams have relied heavily on local talent. The result is one of the most beautifully and professionally packaged fanzines that I've seen, with some very lightweight material in terms of written content... There's an editorial, a report on the KMX fandom, a detailed report on the wedding of Bob Barger and Sandy Paris, and a zine and book review... For a first issue, I give it three staples [Ward Batty]

Mimosa #1, 42 pp. \$1.50 from Nicki and Dick Lynch, 4207 Davis Lane, Chattanooga TN 37416 emerged in January 1982. Dick's closing remarks solicit interesting or amusing articles (previous appearances in apas are no problem) for the July issue. This zine from two of the genre's masters has indeed been long awaited since the demise of CHAT. Embellished principally by Julia Scott, Wade Gilbreath and Charlie Williams, it can become the long-sought "showcase" zine for SFCland if even 1/10th of the talent I seen in apas and other zines will give them support. Jack Chalker's Chattanooga 6 guest speech is here, a captivating Jaggerreport by Guy Lillian (too rarely out of the apas), Eppersouthclave report by Dick, Dolbear's Chattanooga 6 report with appropilios, and Robert's defense of the pun are among the best. Come, July!

My nominee for best regional clubzine-per-se is the Baton Rouge Science Fiction League Newsletter (pr BRSFL News), a bimonthly product of their corporation (Inc.) at 3/\$1 or with clubmembership of \$5 a year. J.R. Madden has toiled at the helm for so long it appears now Clay Fourrier's conscience has at last forced his capable editorship (and lots of pics of weird beasts). As a clubzine it reports on club doings, past and present, cons attended and cons upcoming, reviews and letters. It is an avowed "group effort" and will be interesting to watch, as it has been interesting to read in the past. (P.S. I need your club logo for the next SFC Handbook - 1983?)

Anvil from the Birmingham club rolls along - #15 and 16 were the last of the Nim Gilpatrick issues and with #17 to the latest, #19, D.L. Burden and Jim Cobb edit it for the club. \$3 will get you 6 from PO Box 57031, Birmingham AL 35259.

Jim makes a point which I hereby adopt concerning TIME -there are plenty of excuser for Anvil (or SFC Bulletin) being late-- but no apologies. If we made our living producing ANVIL, no excuse would be valid, and apologies would be delivered forthwith, but we have to make our livings by other means... Anyway, the zine's content seems to sustain well - con reports by Charlotte Proctor, lettercols, good reviews by divers hands, layout and artwork, 24-42 pages in recent issues.

Pong #27 (available from Ted White, 1014 No. Tuckahoe, Falls Church VA 22046) for locs, trades, some 20¢ stamps or \$5) has been reviewed by Cliff Biggers in Atarantes #54, more or less, as follows: "Published and mostly written by Ted White and Dan Steffan, the zine is a very conversational, low-key zine filled with lots of commentary on matters fannish and a non...there are also fanzine reviews (done predominately by Ted) that offer marvelous anecdotes and long-term analyses of the fanzine field in with the reviews! fannish stories of all sorts; and remarkably impressive little illos, mostly in 1"x1" blocks, that have quickly established a strong feel to the zine in terms of layout...in #25 there's a fine piece on fanzine packaging, in particular a McCluhanesque discussion of warm vs cool fanzine packaging."

Since Cliff Biggers has an editorial in Atarantes #50 condemning those who use "clubzine" in a sneering sense, please be advised that it's use herein is a neutrally descriptive term for a zine produced by a club.
