Not having been there at the time, I can speak only from hem arsay. I think, though, that I have gotten it faily straight.

As I heard it, then, SAPS was founded because certain apans Halieved that FAPA was too big and gailated. They thought an apa would work better if it were quite small and its rules were designed to encourage frequent publishing, rather than one lump once a year. They also wanted matters arranged so that new members would have to be active at once, and could not come ins along just for the ride.

The reault was a membership of 25, activity of 6 pages per 2 mailings, and 6 pages activity reauired for admission.

Membership has increased by $40 \%$ since then, and there is a move to raise. it again to $60 \%$ more than the original number or exten throw the club open to indefinite increcse, If such a rule were admyted, SAPS would be flooded by zines of one or two issues, whose publishers dropped out as casually as they antered. Dropping the immediate-activily mule would of course cilleviate this, but this would neail that burdies movid go tc persons who had Iitt?e or no intention of contributing to them. Either would run counter to the founding principles of SAPS.

Do we still want the same things as the founders of SAPS? The results on Proposition One will show that.

I suggest that those who don't want SAPS as it is join FAP4.

OFFICHRS The Official Editor (OE) manages the affairs of Saps. He (she) is omipotent except as regards the basic structure of the society. The Emergency Officer (EO) takes over the duties of the $O$, should the latter be unable to carry out his duties. All other trembers are Vice Presidents.

VHABERSHIP REQUIREMENTS Activity Each member must publish a minimum of six pages in any twomailing period. The pages may be dirided in any way convenient, but each two consecutive mailings muat contain a total of 8 ix or more paces. A page is defined as one side of an $8 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{x} 11$ sheet, or its equivalent. (This page is $8 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{x}$ 11.) Reprinted material, including material pteviousiy distributed anyWhere, is given no credit un less it is over two years old; in which base half-credit is gived. Reprint material is never credited toward basic activity recuirements.

Unless the $O E$ is directed otherwise, a member is eiven credit for all material in hiser zine, even if a part is written by a fellowmember. On the other hand, a member may direct that his own material be credited to someone else.

Dues are
\$2 per year (four mailings.) If a Sap is dropped fofore hiser dues run out, heesh forfeits the balance.

New members must submit their minimum activity requirene nts ( $6 p \mathrm{p}$ ) for the first mailing they receive, and pay mailings dues (\$1). (Or as much dues as they have loose cash, Te'll be glad to take it off their hands.)

SPECIAL NOTE
All entries must be DUPLICATED MATTER. Hand drawing or coloring is not acceptable; the po can make us pay first-class postage for that. In practice, pmonor correctione" are acceptable, suca as when an important word fails to come th ough the stencil. Eva Firestone--you aren't losing the credit I said you would frt Rapp is the man to thenk for that. It is strictly illegal to attach DIFFERENT items to copies. If you staple a quote-card to your covers, it had better be the same cuote every time. I just threw out a group of 20 different cards.
Deadines: Third Saturday of March, June, September, and December.
Oh yes: one more thing. There will be no more of this business of dropping delinauent members to the top of the waiting list. How ere waiting listers ever to get in? A delinquent member, when dropped, may ask to be put at the bottom of the waiting list; otherwise he's had it.

Word just received frus iteward that Raeburn isn't a hoax. Now I don't know what to think. I'm putting him back on the waiting list as No. 5it , but I'll recuire proof that he's real before he can become a member: an old report card should do, or a library card dated at least three years ago. 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## DESPONSES TO THE ANDERSON*BARON MANIEESTO

Cowid insiats-m-end I think it only fair-o-that I should publish Verbatim excerpis from eil answers to our manifesto, Art Rapo se-予ected the following passages as containing the gist of each:

COSHIF I assure you I am not eager to remain OF with all my other activity, . . I admit I am not above being willing to stir things up--or don't you admit they've been rather dead? I for one do not believe in "unbreakable tradition"-.-if the rest become too hide-bound to evolve, I say it's time for drastic ađtion and I trust you've found I'm not afraid to take it---and I trust my hide is thick enough to weather the storm. REF: . . There's a technical difficulty--namely that I n't send out the bundles using Fort Sam Houston as the return address. You see, the ordinary postal channels end at the San Antonio city postoffice, where the Ft. Sam mail is sorted out and goes thru a branch office here on the post. It boils down to the fact that the PO dept, considers the mail delivered when it is turned over to the Army, and from there or * it's up to the army to get it the rest of the way to the in dividual. In otder to send out the bundles at the Third or Fourth Class rates, they have to be marked "printed matter, return postage guaranteed." Unlike the civilian postal systm the Army PO has no provision for collecting postage due on sich mail if it can't bo delivered.

KIEE: If no other able SAP volunteers as OE, I will accept the dictaiorship of Coswal.

CARR: Any change in membership limit should be discussed and voted on by the entire group. . The other points mentioned, ie, the stringent activity reouirements, revised conditions for payment of dues, etc, are matters well within the soope of the $O E$ aad as long as Walt is OE I think he is entitled to enforce them.

WHBER: In case of an actual split in Saps, I will side with those whose rules would approximate most closely the rules existing previous to Coswal's innovations.

McK INNEY: I'm very much in agreement with you, that Coslet seems to have let hi idden ascension to power go to his head. His dictatorial missive made me think immediately of dropping out of SipS--mainly because it would no longer be the organization it was hen $I$ joined a year ago, but ram ther a sort of imftative relative of the WAPA, of which I believe Coslet is also a member.

FICZERI: Upon recaiving Coslet's letter of dictatorship a d cormand as to miling requirements and membership system, John Davis and I were thoroughly disgusted.




PRATROWSKY: I heerility endorea the acolamajoon of irt Rapp as tempar orary OE.

WanSBORalGis I gulte gegee with you that coslet is the most unsuitable sas to be OE.

STEWARD: I have decided that if Coslet enturces there new iulen of his. I woule remain in SAPS, but only putcinis the reavired 2 pages in each mailing, till my number came up in Fapa,": at which time I would drop out of SAPS and put GaSF ir that organization. I am not at all pleased with ure coslet changes.

If you can't ((oust Coswas)) I hesitate to imagine what will happen to the club. I can see it grows ing bigger and bigger, finally becoming something altugem ther useless like the N3F, and eve ntuallybbecoming so bitg that it becomes nebulous and finally ceases to exjst.
REMWS: I think she ((Nangee)) expected that the office of OE would either make or beeak mr coslet as far as SAPS was concerbed, and cause him to either have more interest in SAPS ar be forcibly ejected by the unanimous vote of the members.
BRIGGS: What's thisf When تas Cosler appointed OE? Why wes he? What membership system? Traditions must not be altered:
GRENNELL; Reluctantly Agremith you thet Coslet's rulings, as set forth in his fotent minfesto, strike me as not wholily preferable in spoes.
In fact, my primary impuig ppon receipt of his letter, was to say to Gehenna wh threrganization where rules could change as profoundiy, suddend and unpredictably as Wisconsin weather.

TOTH: I like the idea of eliminating the waiting list-a-woi differ. ence ten or trelve more SAPS? But even in that, Cosletia heavy hand has t ake it as complicated as an income tam: form.
COX: I quite agree tith you it'll more or less disrupi S S PA.
In fact, If not enough members respond to remedy the sitiad tion, Iil? drop out of SAPS for the third and last time. which wili be the first time voluntarily.
SHARE: I agree $\quad$ itha you (and Irene). You can count on my support to reot Coswal and give the Owship to Art.

I hope it remains as it is, for I believe that true ajay enjorrnent daareases inversely as the membershp rises above a certain numier acnewhere around ours. In a boost to forty with the grim deveraination to "go no far in to be cautioned against: back in earlier years the membershi $\quad$ raised from wenty-five to thirty with that intent, and again to thirty-five with the same intention to settie there and maintain the stamus quo. But there will amars be a Waiting list and the friendly desire to extend the bonefits of membership to more people. It must be realized, horevor, that io suocumo to this desire would be to erdanger the very borefita me offer."
I think that corsideration must be taken into account, and agree fully with Blacks desire to keep ShPS a convenient size.
