IT'S BEEN SAID BEFORE, but I expect I'll say it again...and again: The quarterly APA is going down the drain. If asked for reasons for this, I can only suggest my own: I can't live at a snail's-pace of communication when there are more rapid paces available. The idea of taking three to six months between action and reaction (sponse and response?) is stifling, when the weekly APA can cut it down to a 7-14 day interim. And what with the LASFS being on the 2-Party System these days -one on Friday or Saturday, one on Saturday or Sunday -- there is even faster communication through IPR's (Inter-Personal Relationships).

So why stay in SAPS or FAPA? Len Bailes was asking that today, when I told him it was down to the nitty-gritty of Tonight-or-Never for membership-saving. And I don't really have an answer. Inertia, I guess. Maybe Collectors' Mania for not wanting to take a chance on missing receiving a mailing. And, of course, there are people in the quarterly APAs one doesn't interact with anywhere else -- not even conventions.

Enough of that diatribe. If I manage five pages of natterings and MCs, I'll put on the Harness cover I've got, and have a membership-saver. Otherwise, I'll get out.

I won't even go into a lengthy discussion of what I'm writing elsewhere. (Not much, actually -- a parody of <u>Threepenny Opera</u>, a parody of "The Old Woman and the Pig," and a Heicon Report -- all of them continued from week to week.) Instead, right into the Mailing Comments:

<u>SPECTATOR 92</u> (Doreen Webbert, OE): Why doesn't Buz owe two pages? And if Al Snider is dropped, why is he still on the roster? Or have you got him confused with Mike Raub, who should be on the roster, but isn't? T*S*K...

Of those on the Roster-as-is, I've met all but four of the members+WLers: Carlberg, Edmonds, Foyster, and Straw. Of the roster-as-should-be, I'm also missing Raub from SAPS I Have Met. 20 out of 25, for 80 percent. Not too bad, I guess.

THE PIRSI 7 (Burnett Toskey) If Wally and I meet at a con, I will still badger him about his TAFF Report. Otherwise, I will simply give up on the idea that such a thing may be written. I consider it too bad, but that's the way things go.

I think part of the problem with TAFF Reports is that there is no clearly-defined set of responsibilities and ideas connected with TAFF -- as opposed to sets of operating rules, which are clearly-defined. It is a matter of argument whether TAFF Candidate Material should be drawn from the ranks of those fans who have earned an Honor from Fandom, or from those who would make the best representatives of their national (etc.) fandoms to overseas fandom, or from those whom the overseas fans indicate they would most like to meet. I tend to vote for the second category, figuring that to send over someone who would not mix well with overseas fans in general -- and with many segments of overseas fandom that would turn up at the convention to which the TAFFman is sent -would be disastrous. With these three possibilities (at least), there are many opportunities for whole areas of fandom to be disappointed by the results of a TAFF race, even

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when the majority voted for the winner -- and even when everyone who meets the winner admits he makes a good candidate. Secondly, there is the question of the Report. Many people vote for TAFF because they want to see the overseas convention through the eyes of the TAFFman. Yet there is no defined responsibility to write such a report. I discovered, on my Heicon trip, that Tom Schlück isn't writing one, either -- he has been advertising TAFF through his slide show and taped commentary that he takes to various and sundry conventions, and can't see why anyone would actually care about a written and published Report. (We tried to talk him into transcribing the taped commentary and using that as a Report, but I'm not sure we got anywhere with the idea.) In any case, under the present set-up, getting a TAFF Report is quite uncertain, and I guess I shall have to stop expecting one from all TAFF winners.

Somehow, I'm mildly appalled to have you admit to never having heard of either Larry Niven or Keith Laumer. I assume you don't read SF magazines this side of 1960.

Mythopoeic Society is indeed full of girls. Most of them, however, are jailbait. If this fact deters you, you probably won't find the Mythos a worthwhile hunting ground. There are some exceptions -- notably, I believe, the Long Beach Chapter, which tends to take things far less seriously than other Chapters that are overladen with teenybopper-types.

LA fans will play damn near any game for money. The latest is Bridge, and the many-year run of poker seems to have ended abruptly. Those who don't play Bridge -or those who won't (like me) wind up playing something like Oh Hell instead. I doubt if you'd find LASFS Poker boring, though -- there are enough permutations to the hands that it takes several months to learn all of them thoroughly, and then the people change enough , and new games are invented, so there is almost always something new.

Y'know, Tosk -- sorry, Burnett -- I get the impression that those who've been in SAPS since I got in -- or almost, call it the last ten years, anyway -- haven't really changed. I don't know if that's good or bad, but I think it's true. Some have got married; some have got older and tireder. Other than that, stasis. And I wonder if I seem the same as when I got in back in 1958? If so, I think I'll quit and do something about the problem. I seriously doubt there is such a thing as a good stasis.

While I'm here I might as well comment on the Worldcon situation with regard to the next couple bids for non-North American cons. As most everyone knows by now (those who actually care, anyway), the Worldcons are back on a three-year rotation plan as a result of the Heicon bidding session and business meeting. The three zones are the old three of North America. A non-NA bid may be entered at any time, however, even if there was a successful non-NA bid the previous year. (This is a change from the original 3-year rotation, which provided that non-NA bids could not be consecutive.) At this time there are only two non-NA bidders in view: Australia for 1975 (tobe bidding in 1973, somewhere in the Central Region), and Stockholm in 1976 (to be bidding in 1974, on the East Coast.)

Each of these bids must convince a North American Worldcon business meeting that it should have the Worldcon. Each has advantages and disadvantages. Australia's advantages include the fact that they bid first. It will have been five years between overseas worldcons. They will be bidding against West Coast groups, and one of the probably opponents, ConFusion, bidding for Los Angeles, is willing to support Australia and withdraw from the Worldcon bidding in favor of holding a North American Con over the Labor Day weekend. (It has been suggested that Australia will therefore bid to hold the Eorldcon in late August, so that U S. fans may hit both cons on one trip.) Disadvantages include the expense of getting to Australia from anywhere else, and the feeling now current that the Australia Committee is more than slightly nebulous and may not last even

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long enough to put in their bid in 1973. The length of time between decision-to-bid (now) and placement-of-bid (1973) can be both useful and detrimental -- three years to get organized, or three years to have the whole thing collapse.

Stockholm's advantage is that more people can go from the States, and they will have more popular support from people wanting an excuse for a European vacation. (The expense of planning an Asian vacation as part of a trip to Australia is much higher, even relatively speaking.) In addition, they have their city picked, and an actual bidding committee instead of an investigatory committee. They have already built a fair amount of personal support for their bid. Bésidés/ thet speak English/ And/ If Australia wins 1975, though, Stockholm will have a much harder time getting the 1976 Worldcon, from a reluctance to let the thing go two years in succession. (If Australia loses, Stockholm should have a walkaway.)

I intend to support both bids, and try to talk the bidders for NA cons in 1976 (Central region; no bidders yet announced.) to go for a NA con instead of the Worldcon. (I'll try to convince San Francisco to do the same for 1975, but I doubt they'll listen to me.) I doubt, however, that I'll be able to go to Australia, unless I get a sudden windfall and can take a cruise there.

The West Coast has been slow starting in getting more regional cons, but by now it is well on the way. SFCon 70 paved the way for a winter regional, so there will be a con over President's Day -- the new National Holiday starting in 1971 making a 3-day weekend out of whichever weekend includes the third Monday in February -- in Los Angeles every other year when the Westercon is in the Northern area. Lee and Barry Gold put on the first Symposium -- a very low-pressure, almost programless relaxicon -- in Long Beach in September, and will probably be continuing them annually (probably moving the date to Memorial Day weekend). Those, plus Westercons, Worldcons every once in a while, and some almost-SF conventions like the Bouchercon (which is a SF con with a Mystery-oriented program), should be enough to keep the con fans occupied.

I agree with you completely about such nutty things as astrology, graphoanalysis, and such -- fun as parlor games, of course, but not for actual belief. Tarot, on the other hand... (hi)
