HEADLINE NEWS Votes are now being accepted in the 1985-86 TAFF race, which will select a European fan to be sent to the 1986 World Science Fiction Convention over Labor Day weekend in Atlanta, Georgia. The fan thus chosen will also visit other fan groups in North America as time, circumstances, and money allow; upon their return, they will then take up the duties of European TAFF administration for the following two years. Anyone may vote who has been active in fandom since before September, 1984; votes must be entered on authentic TAFF ballots (both sides), signed, and accompanied by a donation of not less than \$1 or bl. The choice you make on your ballot is between you, your Administrators, and God (not necessarily in that order of importance). To be counted, votes must be in the hands of Rob Hansen or the Nielsen Haydens by midnight, May 15, 1986; barring unforeseen circumstances, a result will be announced within 24 hours. A copy of the ballot is enclosed and further reproduction and distribution of ballots within fandom is encouraged. Close cover before striking. Light flame and stand back.

AND DON'T FORGET: THE TRANSATLANTIC HEARING AID, Dave Langford's 76-page report on his 1980 TAFF trip to Noreascon 2 and points beyond; available from us for \$3.50. Profusely illustrated by Barker, West, Taral, Gilliland, Steffan, Foster, Shiffman, ATom, and Hansen. You are there:
