THE PERFECT FANZINE

By David H. Keller

Written for the Torcon Issue of TNFF

OT being the editor of a fanzine, and never intending to be one it is evident that I know exactly what salient points the perfect anateur publication should posses. Therefore, knowing very well that my suggestions . will not meet with the approval of many fanzine oditors I will proceed to give my ten point program for the editing of a magazine that would be satisfactory to me.

1. The name. This should be offtrail, and not include the words fantasy, wierd, science or fiction. It has to be a name casily romembered with a definite meaning and connection with the magazine as an ontity.

2. As a magazine depends on its contributors I would acknowledge promptly all papers sent to me. If not harmonious with the editorial policy I would return them at once with a note of ex planation and thanks and a request for other contributions, giving my thought as to what they should be. If I accept would write and give due thanks and a definite statement as to when the material would be published. When published the contributor would receive some extra numbers and be given at least one years subscription.

3. Each issue would contain one strong, well written editorial of general interest.

4. I would cut to the minimum lottors which tall how good the magazine is. Perhaps it would be a novelty to print only letters of condemnation. It seems to me that the average letter section of the professional magazines, mainly lauditory, is simply a wasto of pulp paper.

5. Avoid arguments. Some fanzines seem so devoid of metorial that they encourage controversics between prominent fans. As a rule no one except the fams involved are interested. Eventually the reader tires of the debate and at last are uncertain what it is all about, why it was started, ot why it should be continued.

6. I would endeavor to have in every issue one story, er ticlo, poen or illustration which would make that issue a collector's item. This should be advortised a month in advance. Difficult - cortainly, but it can be done.


7. If there is a book review section, have it conducted by an Associate Editor who knows how to write reviews intelligently, honostly and without produdice.

8. The magazino should be beautiful in format and of a high literary value. There should be some art but romember that the nature fan is tired of nudity and poorly done comics. One fine pictute is far botter than a dozen poor onos.

9. If possible avoid advertising. If necessary to help with the costs place it all at the end of the issue and not interspace it with the reading matter.

10. Havo the print logible, easy to road, clear.

Finally do not start a fanzine unless you are cortain it will live for at least a year. Mail three hundred copies of the first issue free and after that send only to paid subscrib ers and contributors. Study fanzines like the Gorgon, Commenta tor, Dream Quest, Canadian Fandom and they make an effort to get out a better publication. If you are able to do that you can make your fanzine self supporting.

Dear Ray and N3F Mombers,
