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THE FAN OF THE MONTH!

((Because the National Fantasy Fan Federation is only as active as the members who compose it, but some fans seem to think that everyone can sit back, relax, and have a super-duper fanclub materialize without effort -- the NFF has decided to give recognition to some of the fans whose expenditure of time and effort are the only things keeping NFF alive.)

((Have you a nomination for the future "fan-of-the-month"? If so, write to any of the Directors of NFF, giving the reasons for your choice. Who knows -- perhaps someone who is doing a great deal to benefit fandom keeps so quiet about his work that you're the only one who knows about him!))

THERE ARE two ways to become a "big wheel" in fandom. The easy and sure way is to criticize everything that other fans do, spout learned theories about how the projects should be handled, and give everyone the impression that the only thing holding fandom back is that your own unparalleled genius hasn't been recognized. Ultimately, fans will have heard your name mentioned so many times that they'll decide you must know something about fandom, and will eventually conclude that you're one of its main pillars. Then you can ascend to FAPA in a fiery chariot, secure in the knowledge that you've won a place in fanhistory.

The second method isn't so popular. To get reknown this way, you think up constructive suggestions when fan projects run into difficulties. You cut down on the time devoted to building up your own reputation, and instead co-operate with other fans in projects which will benefit fandom as a whole. You utilize your increasing knowledge of the ropes, not to laugh at the mistakes of neofan, but as a means of helping them get acquainted with the complexities and pitfalls of this vast and screwballishly-organized hobby.

NFFF's first "Fan of the Month" uses the second method --- and recognition of his service to fantasy fandom is long overdue. His name is --

K. MARTIN CARLSON

Martin's address is probably the most widely-known in fandom - 1028 Third Ave. South, Moorhead, Minnesota. One of fandom's old-timers, he served for a long period as Secretary-Treasurer of the NFFF, as well as putting out his own fanzine, Kay - Mar Trader.

During the recent wartime and postwar slump in NFFF, Martin al-

most single-handed kept the organization from disintegrating completely. He was instrumental in launching -- and completing -- such projects as the Keller book, Fantasy Aspects, printed stationery and membership cards, etc. All this, remember, in addition to the necessary but boring duties of keeping the NFFF accounts, membership list, etc.

Since the organization of the WelCom, Martin has undertaken most of the duties connected with that phase of NFFF activity. This was not assuming additional burden for him -- it was what he'd been doing all along, unofficially! At present he is devoting his full efforts to recruiting and welcoming new members to NFFF -- and you can see the results of his work in almost every prozine lettercolumn, as well as in the steadily-increasing roster of the NFFF.

Martin's attitude toward fandom has always been that of the hobbyist, not the pro. In Kay-Mar Trader for April 1947, for example, he wrote:

"It was my brave intention at the time that KMT was first put out to try to hold prices on stfmags down as close to the cover price as possible. But with everything else going up - up -- up, there has been a general slacking up of that policy. All I can do is urge all traders and buyers to ignore the high priced items and so in time force the prices down. Where is the value of \$1.00 for a 1942 FFM? Certainly it is ok to ask the price -- but do they ever hope to get it? The American housewife showed us how to get the prices of meat, etc., down during the war. Simply don't buy it."

"Take your time in trading or buying. There will always be someone who wants to sell, for one reason or another. By buying those high-priced mags you invite a general raise of prices. Let them keep them on their shelves. No profit to them that way, you know. This 'getting all that the market will bear' has always gone against the grain as far as I'm concerned. A hobby shouldn't become a high priced business instead."

Consider that the above editorial appeared in a fanzine devoted almost entirely to advertising! You can see that Martin places the interests of fandom above his own personal profits.

I would like to include in this article more biographical data on K. Martin Carlson who had some tolerant words and constructive suggestions for my first horrible attempt at a fanzine --- and many a time, when I've inquired about some NFFF project or activity, it turned out that while the credit went to NFFF as an organization, the actual work of stencil-cutting, mimeo-turning, or other boring tasks, was being done by just one person, the fan who deserves recognition from the N3F and from all fandom if anyone does.....

SNEARY REPORTS FOR THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Members of the NFFF:

Two months have swept by, and more advances have been made. Not as great as in the first months, but still the NEW NFFF moves forward. The budget is now completed. So that of your dollar dues, 50% goes for the bigger and better Official Organs, 20% for running the club, and 30% for work projects, such as the Fan Directory.

Also you will find mention elsewhere in this issue of a NFFF Auxiliary. It is just newly formed, and as yet your Directors do not know what their plans are, but we hope that by the next issue we will be able to welcome them fully into the Federation.

I'm sure you will all be glad to know that the NFFF is going to the Cincinnati Convention, and going officially. We will have a table displaying the work the NFFF has done, and we hope to be given a part of the convention time. President Tarr will be there, along with nearly all the officers. Even Director Cox up in Maine is hoping to make it. So if you have any beefs or bouquets, you can deliver them in person. You might also bring along your best selling manners, and try and sign up as many non-NFFFers as you can. Remember, you get a free years dues with each five new members you get. Harry Moore really cleaned up at the Torcon, why don't you try it too?

While speaking of Conventions, there is another idea we would like to put before you. Your Directors have been talking it over and like it, but think it is too big for five fans to decide. So we are asking what you think.

As you know the present system for selecting Convention sights is for some one to get up at the preceeding one and to nominate it, and then have the majority of those there vote in favor of it. This system has been criticized for various reasons. For one thing, as the voting is done at one of the lesser important business meetings, not all those attending actually vote. Of those that do vote, the majority are almost always from within a few hundred miles.

It was suggested at the Pacificon, and possibly elsewhere that fans traveling a long distance be given a greater number of votes to equalize matters, but this seemingly was never done. So we still have the same unfair set-up, in which a few fans, lucky enough to live within easy reach of the Convention sight are intrusted with the picking of the next years convention. In the past it has seemingly worked alright, but it is unfair, for only a few to decide something that is important to so many.

An idea has been suggested, that I personally like, and the other Directors look on with favor. It is, that the NFFF pick the sight by polling its members. Each year the O-O could carry the list of cities that want the next years convention, along with a letter explaining the reason they want it, and what they have to offer fans coming there. This way Portland Oregon and Portland Maine will have equal chances. The NFFF who reaches out into all

the states, is the logical agent to operate such a poll. It has the facilities and the name.

The NFFF would not "take over" the conventions. They would be run just the same as now. No one would have to fear that a slow administration would kill the convention. But it would be sure every fan, no matter where, got a voice in the most important question of the year.

That is the idea. What do you think? The pages of the OO are always open to you. Send in your idea, be they suggestions or damnations, to either your editor or me. This is the question for you to decide. Do you, as the largest organized group of fans, want the NFFF to aid in selecting the convention sights or not? Let us know!

It was a surprise for two reasons, (1) I haven't been in the habit of thinking of this enterprise as another N3F committee since our plans call for a name, OO, constitution of our own and projects. (2) He is the first of our officers in the N3F to give us any special recognition OFFICIALLY.

At present our membership is over twenty. Our three committees, Membership, Constitution, and Publishing are organized and functioning 100%. As yet we have not decided upon the amount of dues, but there is plenty of work for everyone. (b) Frequency of issue, subscription price to non-members, and the exact nature of any savings offered to NFFF members.

(c) A short statement of how your zine should be described. For example: "A variety of material to please every taste," or "The latest news of fan and pro doings," etc. You can undoubtedly think up a better way of describing your zine to prospective readers than anyone else can.

5. The listing in TNFF will caution readers that they will not receive the discount unless they specifically request it when sending you their subscriptions, and unless they state at that time that they are NFFF members. So you need not take extra time out to cross check against the roster of NFFF members, unless you wish to do so for your own satisfaction.

SUGGESTION BOX


Regarding a suggestion in The Suggestion Box, I too would like to see a con within a con at the Convention. The fellow who thought of it should organize it. It would be rather nice to see all the N3F members in one group. The following is my SUGGESTION:

I would like to see an article or series of articles (if one article would be too long) in the TNFF telling us what is the difference between the various processes for reproduction such as Planography, Lithographing, Photolitho' and any and all other processes for reproducing fanzines. The idea is to inform us who don't know, how to discern the difference between them if there is a difference, which would be the better method to employ considering type of art immediately available to prospective editors. What methods reproduce pen and ink, shaded crayon, pencil, etc., and which method is the least expensive? It might be well to include the approximate cost of reproducing a complete 20 page zine by the 200 copies.
