CLUB ACTIVITIES

I have been criticized for writing here "short summaries of bureaus that are worse than useless" and for having "reduced the departmental reports to something not worth reading."

These summaries are not condensations of long bureau reports that have been mercilessly squeezed out of TNFF. They are substitutes for reports that are not sent in at all.

So if you want more than summaries here, you will have to complain to the bureau heads, including the one who made the above complaints, who has not himself sent in a report to me or to the TNFF editor since the beginning of the year. All Welcommittee "reports" in 1968 were written by me.

Since I have had other letters commending this resume of bureau activities, I will go on with it, until I get more than one complainer. Let me know what you think.

Overseas Bureau. Michel Barnes sends reports to TNFF and apologizes for not sending them to me also. I don't complain about this, as long as they get in, and I (as President) know what's going on. Mike sends me quite a bit of information in a letter, that I could repeat here, but I suppose he will have a report in this issue and I don't want to duplicate that. He has worked out quite a few new ideas for the Overseas Bureau, and is going as well as can be expected for a new, enthusiastic bureau chairman. I hope this enthusiasm holds out.

Final Call For Elections. You have only till August 1st to file for the offices of 1969 President and Director of N3F. To file, send an informal notice to the Secretary-Treasurer, Janie Lamb (with copy to the President) stating your intention to serve if elected, and be sure your 1969 dues are paid. A platform, of not more than one printed page, can be sent to the TNFF editor. This platform should contain no libel or obscenity (because it must be published without editing) and will be rejected if it does, to protect the club and its editor. All this should be postmarked by August 1st, 1968, the statement of intention to qualify for the ballot, and the platform to be printed in the August TNFF. The ballots will go out with the October issue, giving some time for campaigning, unlike previous years in N3F.

We already have some candidates for Director, but none so far for President. I hope someone files, as I am not going to run myself. . . . ((A portion is deleted here concerning what might happen if no one should file, as one person has filed for President since Don wrote this report. -- ed.)) . . . I will not accept a write-in.

I don't seem to have any more information from bureau heads to summarize here, so perhaps they have all submitted reports to Don Miller. I hope so.

Overseas Bureau

I have published my o-o -- everyone who has asked, as well as all of the overseas fans and officers of the various bureaus will receive a copy. The cost of subscription is the price of postage, only.

The loose organization of overseas fandom is beginning to react. I have begun to receive articles and letters from the various countries and their respective fandoms, the most noteworthy being a periodical, EUROPEAN LINK, published by Jean Muggoch, who is my opposite number in BSFA Ltd. In her publication she collects and publishes bits of news about the countries of England, Italy, the Scandinavian countries, the Netherlands, France, Spain, Belgium, Germany, Russia, and others. It is an excellent newsletter, and Jean Muggoch and I are making plans to work together to enable a closer contact between the sub-cultured fandoms.

like to mention here the S.F. Film Festival in Trieste July 6-13th. In it, countries from the continents of Europe, Asia, and North America will be showing some of their sf films, with the most films expected from the U.S. Now, can anyone tell me just who is representing American fandom, and if there is anyone who represents N3F? If we are an international foundation we should have some contacts at this activity which will bring together sf enthusiasts from all parts of the world. Another suggestion I have is that perhaps we could obtain some contact who would report to us on conventions and convention preparations overseas — particularly on the one to be hosted (if they win) in Germany in 1970! American fandom is sitting around, letting the rest of the world go by as it rests in its almighty splendor, decadent by some peoples' standards! A great deal is going on overseas — much more than we in America realize....

I am in contact with non-Neffers in an attempt to learn more about overseas fandom. As in N3F, there are particular fans in each country who are the founders of the fannish movement in their countries, and thus know the most about the movement. I am enlisting the aid of these persons and of Neffers to help author a booklet, perhaps produced on N3F funds, about overseas fandom. Each country will be represented by an article written by a person of that country, and will be an attempt to explain the pecularities of that country, as well as its interests, strong points, and weak points. (A number of overseas fans, and a few domestic ones, have suggested a small pamphlet of this sort designed for overseas circulation so that the fans there will be able to understand what goes on here!)

The most active of the overseas fans are in the N3F -- a tremendous resource going to waste. I can not, of course, blame this wastage only on the domestic fans and members -- the European fans have a tendency to drag their feet just as much as we do. For some strange reason, the boundaries in fandom are not receding, but growing! Even Europe is not as organized as one might think it would be. There exists a large gap in the exchange of information between fandoms in various countries and on various continents. I suppose that is one of the main reasons the Overseas Bureau exists. So, I shall return to my air mail stamps.... Any comments would be greatly appreciated.
