

A FEW SMALL WORDS

November will be an important month for both TAPF (the Trans-Atlantic-Fan Fund) and the NFFF Short Story Contest. TAPF votes, administered by November 16 to be counted. Story entries will be extended from the November 1 deadline to at least midmonth, and perhaps will be extended to the end of the month. If information arrives in time to confirm the later date it will be included in this issue. In any case, time is not far enough in the future to put it off; if you wish to vote on each or either, use enclosed ballots to vote.

The ballots for the 1973a NFFF election is something that may not seem so timely, but to us it is as important. Ballots this issue seem destined to go out without platforms; evidently all who wished to write them did it in a previous NFFF. To make it more likely overseas members can vote they will be sent airmail, as distance would make sea-mail too slow to get votes in time to collate for the December NFFF.

THE TAPF BALLOT on this side of the ocean goes to Elliot Shorter, Box 309, Jerome Ave. Sta., Bronx, NY 10468. Voting is open to anyone who was active in fandom (via fanzines, clubs, conventions and so on) prior to September 1970. Anyone can contribute to this good cause, however, in case you are not as yet eligible to vote, or prefer to contribute without making a choice. In the past a sum has been sent to me as President to send in, but you can contribute it directly to Elliot Shorter or the other administrators. NFFF supports as individuals or through publicity many worthy activities, but there is none really more worthy than this. This is not exactly as I would like to write it though; I am renting a machine to get more words than my Pica would allow and it imposes its presence on me. I'm not sure I've avoided typos as in back-spacing I've not always found my place. (Ah, there's one--and if I try to correct it, I'll probably miss my place in retyping.)

THE 1972 SF-Fantasy Short Story Contest rules are not much different than last year, and as you will see a copy in this issue if I can type it clearly enough. Howard ran some off, intending to provide some for our publications--but the stencil tore before he could. I knew how that is: I tore the stencil I used to put out a page about the club to hand out at LACon. My solution was to retype it clearly and have it offset. I've enough copies left over to enclose them, except I would also like to send this first-class to get all this information out swiftly, so it may be forced out. I may stop spacing between lines if I'm really short of space!

When Gary Mattingly wrote he had to get a job, cut back on his fandom and maybe drop out as a Directorate candidate he suggested maybe Tim Marion or someone could take on the editing job. I wrote Tim, about that time, to accept him as new head of NFAS--the New Fanzine Appreciation Society. He sent me copy of his report, which he photostated--which I appreciate. He wrote to Tb and I'll let him speak for himself. Anyway, I'm doing the issue myself as a first issue has its problems for anyone and I've some idea of what is needed and have done other issues--so I'll just do it. Hope this type is readable--and hope I can remove the double-letters where I do not backspace properly when my first stroke is too light, as it was "up there"....

David K. Patrick, the Official Editor of the Neffer Amateur Press Alliance, wrote to say that though he owns the mimeo on which he hand-eranks his material (and the publication for ERIS) it is not at his home--but if I can't find someone else he would try to put the issue out. I thank you, Dave--but did it myself. I'll probably crank it out myself; I couldn't get a manual or reach the ABick people.

After running this off I'll know if I've goofed: maybe if the o's and d's are out out as they appear, and some capital letters as dim as they appear on stencil (the reason I've back-spaced and miss-hit some letters) I'll be able to watch my stroke and do it right at first stroke. In other ways this machine works well: my fingers are blunt and on some machines rub together, or I hit two letters at once. So though a few things are in familiar--rather unfamiliar--places, I should be able to master this soon. I hope.

The State of the Round Robins

Robins are fun if you have been in one. I should know--I am in four (soon five) and three of those I have started myself.

Round Robins are basically this: Everyone on a designated list (from about 5 to 6 people) writes a letter and adds it to a bundle of other letters in one envelope. It starts as one letter from the originator/launcher. When it reaches the last person, in the robinator/launcher gets a bundle with a letter from everyone.

The originator-launcher then takes out his first letter and adds on to the bundle a new letter thereby starting round #2. The robin list (routesheet) stays within the rr until the robin is terminated by mutual agreement--usually after many rounds.

Round Robins may be of special categories such as zodiac robins (you have people of a single astrological sign or several exchanging news, chatter, etc.), art robins in which a group of robineers exchange artwork (such as cartoons), overseas robins (including non pan-American Neffers) or a general discussion--this robin is my favorite type of robin.

If you would like to form a category robin please write Elinor Poland giving her your sign, birthdate, interests, and so forth.

If you wish to form a foreign round robin, you may write to our Overseas Bureau head--Dorothy Jones. In foreign robins you may have to keep it to 3 pages of onionskin paper placed in AIRMAIL envelopes. That way postage rates are kept to a minimum.

If you would like to form a general interest round robin--please write to me and I'll form groups of compatible robineers--might even be in it myself.

Round Robin originator-launchers--send your reports to Rose M. Hogue. If you wish to be in robins please write to me, Elinor Poland, Dorothy Jones, Rose Hogue, Sheryl Birkhead or Stan Woolston. If you wish to start robins write to them or me.

RULES FOR THE 1972 SF-FANTASY SHORT STORY CONTEST

SPONSORED BY THE NATIONAL FANTASY FAN FEDERATION

1. The contest is open to all amateur writers in this field. We define an amateur as one who has sold no more than two stories to the professional science fiction and fantasy publications.

2. Stories must be the original unpublished work of the entrant, must be less than 5,000 words in length, and must come within the field of science fiction and/or fantasy in the opinion of the judges.

3. Stories should be typed on 8½x11 sheets of white paper, double spaced with the title on each page but the name of the author should not appear anywhere on the manuscript, to insure impartiality.

Identity of the author will be known only to the contest manager who will retain all entry blanks until the contest closes.

4. Contestants may enter any number of stories. Each should be accompanied by a stamped self-addressed envelope and a separate entry blank.

A fee of 25¢ should accompany each entry unless the contestant is a member in good standing of NFFF or BSFA, in which case no fee is required.

5. Contestants are expected to retain one or more copies of each story entered. The NFFF undertakes to use all possible care, but cannot guarantee against accidental loss in the mail.

6. First prize is \$15; second prize is \$10; third prize is \$5. Other prizes may be awarded if the final judge believes they merit them.

7. Final judging begins in November; date has been extended till at least November 15. All entries must be before this date. Judging will be done by a committee of professional science fiction writers, with final judging by Mr. Ed Ferman, senior editor of the Magazine of Fantasy and Science Fiction.

8. Winners will be notified by mail as soon as judging is completed. A full report will be made to the NFFF members sometime after the first of the year, in an issue of TNFF.
