

Joanna Russ Bio-Bibliography

Science fiction (SF) and fantasy (F) author Joanna Russ died on April 29, 2011, in Tucson, Arizona, following a series of strokes. No known family members survived.



Personal Life

She was born on February 22, 1937 in New York




City and began creating works of fiction at a very early age -- filling notebooks with stories, poems, comics, and illustrations, often hand-binding her work with thread.

Russ received a B. A. degree from Cornell University in 1957, where she studied under Vladimir Nabokov. She began publishing science fiction

(SF) in 1959 with her short story "Nor Custom Stale" in The Magazine of Fantasy & Science Fiction (F&SF). In 1960 she earned an M. F. A. in playwriting from the Yale Drama School and began teaching in New York -- before moving to Boulder, Colorado, and, eventually, Seattle, Washington, where she taught English at the University of Washington from 1984 until 1994.

Major Publications


She published her first novel, Picnic on Paradise (part of her series of stories about her sword and sorcery heroine Alyx) in 1968 and followed it up with several more novels. In 1975 she published her ground-breaking feminist novel The Female Man (about four versions of the personality of one woman), which later was awarded a retro-Tiptree



Award. Around the time of its publication, Russ -- who had been married (no children), and divorced -- came out as a lesbian.

In addition to writing SF and horror, Russ also wrote several non-fiction works, including How to Suppress Women's Writing and What Are We Fighting For? (a book-length study of feminism).

In addition to her fiction and non-fiction works, Russ was also a playwright and an essayist. Her short fiction was collected in Alyx (1976), The Zanzibar Cat (1983), Extra (ordinary) People (1984), and The Hidden Side of the Moon (1987).



She also wrote a contemporary novel, On Strike Against God (1980), and a children's book, Kittatinny: A Tale of Magic (1978).

Awards/Honors/Recognitions

In the 1960s and 1970s Russ reviewed books for F&SF, receiving a Pilgrim Award (for her body of work in genre criticism) in 1988.

Her fiction won two retro-Tiptree Awards, a Hugo Award (for "Souls," a novella), and a Nebula Award for her short story "When It Changed." Russ' "The Autobiography of My Mother" was one of the O. Henry Prize stories in 1977.

She was inducted into the Science Fiction Hall of Fame in 2013

Concluding Remarks

Russ was also part of the taboo-breaking New Wave SF movement and continually experimented with her writing style.

Her novel And Chaos Died attempted to portray telepathy as directly as possible. She was also one of the first major SF writers to take slash fiction (romantic/sexual relations between fictional characters of the same sex) and its literary implications seriously.

Russ was the subject of Jeanne Cortiel's Demand My Writing: Joanna Russ/Feminism/Science Fiction (1999) and Farah Mendlesohn's On Joanna Russ (2009).

Welcome to the Writers Exchange!

The Writers Exchange Bureau is for anyone interested in writing. You don't have to be a published writer, or strive to be a published writer. You don't have to have written a book, a poem, a story, or the lyrics to a song. All you need is an interest in writing.

Writers Quote for the Month

'Your writing voice is the deepest possible reflection of who you are. The job of your voice is not to seduce or flatter or make well-shaped sentences. In your voice, your readers should be able to hear the contents of your mind, your heart, your soul.' – Meg Rosoff*

Last month I talked about detail and dialogue and how I felt about each. I said;, "I like dialogue, but not too much of it at once. I like it short and to the point." Jefferson Swycaffer not only read my article, but responded to it. Thank You, Jefferson. It's nice to know I'm not writing to myself.

Jefferson wrote:

Hi, Judy! Here are some thoughts about Detail and Dialogue -- the writers' form of D&D!

Both detail and dialogue are important -- almost vital. A story can exist without any dialogue, but it would be a weak offer, lacking the most useful tool in building characterization. Dialogue is how we really get to know characters, how they convey their thoughts to the reader.

Dialogue is also a very useful way of conveying narrative information to the reader. The narrator can say, "The ship was a mile long," or a character can say, "Holy Cow, that ship must be a mile long!" These are both valuable tools in our toolbox.

The late, great Poul Anderson used to say that it was his goal to invoke all five of the reader's senses in every page of his story. I sometimes think that might be a little excessive, but the principle is valid. The reader should be transported to the scene, and the writer needs to assist the reader in perceiving the scene, just as if the reader were there in person. The writer should function as a multi-sensory camera, making a movie that the reader, in his mind, watches, hears, and feels.

I have a dear friend who wrote his first book -- and congratulations to him, most certainly! But he likes to play coy, cagey little games with his readers, withholding important information. For instance, if a character suddenly grows horns, my friend would not say, "The character suddenly grew horns." Instead, he'll say something like, "At this point, it would be impossible for Jack to go into town to pick up his daughter." He won't say ^why^! He will reveal this to the reader at a later time. I hold this to be a sin. I believe the writer needs to present to the reader all the information that the reader would, personally, perceive if he were standing right in the scene. The "unreliable narrator" trope is, in my opin-

ion, a bad one, and should not be used.

Thank you, Jefferson. You have made a good point about the importance of dialogue. I can understand where dialogue is very important in a book.

I must confess, I am horrible at dialogue. I rarely use it. My dialogue doesn't sound real. Occasionally, I will have a character say something, but it is usually what he is thinking, not what is coming from his mouth.

I only write short stories, poems and what I call story poems. I work mostly with feelings. Following is the beginning of a story poem:

The song of the Siren calls from the sea

I try to resist
As have others before me
But all of the stories end the same
A man is torn from his family and land
To die alone Where water meets sand

I would like to hear from other writers on how they feel about dialogue and what sort of stories they like to write. .


Please do not contact a reader unless I have assigned that reader to you. Occasionally we get several short stories at the same time and I don't want any of our readers getting "reading overload."

Story Contest Rules and Entry Blank

Now and then, it has been suggested to open the N3F Amateur Short Story Contest to professional writers, writers who have had one or two sales. I've never favored this. It is my opinion that we want new blood. We want to reward the new kids on the block. To be blunt, we want writing that is not that good. We want stories from people who don't know their object from their subject, who don't know where commas go, and who use apostrophes to denote plurals -- but who have a story to tell. I want stories from guys nobody's ever heard of...but in the years ahead, we will. Those who are already successful don't need the encouragement of our little contest. If they were to enter the contest, the danger is that they'd win, every time, and crowd out the promising newcomer.

- 1. This contest is open to all amateur writers in the field, regardless of whether they're members of the National Fantasy Fan Federation. For the purposes of this contest, we define an amateur as someone who has sold no more than two (2) stories to professional science fiction or fantasy publications.
- 2. Stories entered in the contest must be original, unpublished, not longer than 8,500 words in length—and must be related to the science fiction, fantasy, or similar genres in the opinion of the judge.
- 3. Email attachments of Word documents are acceptable for submission. Manuscripts on paper should be typed, single sided on 8 1/2"-by- 11" white paper, double spaced, with pages numbered. The name of the author should not appear anywhere on the manuscript to ensure impartial judging. Photocopies are acceptable, if they are of good quality. Computer printouts must be legible.
- 4. Contestants can enter up to three stories. Enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope (SASE) if you would like your story returned at the end of the contest. Stories will not be returned without an SASE. Do not send your only copy in case of accidental loss. We are not responsible for lost manuscripts.
- 5. Email entries will be accepted. Send to Jefferson P. Swycaffer at abontides@gmail.com. No guarantee can be made of email receipt. Privacy and property rights will be absolutely respected. No one other than the Short Story Judge will ever see the submission.

6. There are no entry fees.

- 7. Cash prizes totaling \$100 will be awarded as follows: First prize is \$50, second \$30, and third \$20. Honorable mentions and semi-finalists will receive a certificate of award.
- 8. Send all manuscripts to the contest manager: Jefferson Swycaffer, P. O. Box 15373, San Diego, CA 92175-5373; abontides@ gmail.com. Emails with the story attached in word format are preferred. Paper manuscripts are acceptable. All entries must be received or postmarked no later than Dec. 31, 2024.
- 9. The Short Story Judge is a published science fiction professional, and also a loving fan of the sf and fantasy genres. All comments and critiques are solely the Short Story Judge's opinion, but he promises to be constructive and polite.
- 10. Stories will also be reviewed by the Editor of the N3F Fiction zine Eldritch Science; authors of suitable tales will be invited to submit their tales for publication in our zine. This review and invitation will only occur after contest winners have been announced, so it can have no effect on the contest outcome.
- 11. The NSF may want to publish an electronic book including top entries from one or more years of publication. You will not be contacted about this until after the contest is over and prizes have been awarded. If we want to publish your story, you will have to sign over to us first world serial rights. Your willingness to sign over rights cannot affect whether or not you win the contest. Winners will be notified as soon as the judging is completed. Announcements and notifications of winning entries will be made by March 2025. Please take your time and submit your best work. You can resubmit stories previously entered if they did not win previously. All entries will be kept confidential and will be judged fairly and anonymously. The deadline for all entries is Dec. 31, 2024. Good luck!
