CLUB ACTIVITIES

Welcommittee. Here's another list of current Welcommittee members, received from Art Hayes. Besides ann Chamberlain, former Chairman, who is on leave of absence, there are Elaine Cooke, Chris, Leigh and Lesleigh Couch, Robert Gersman, Art Hayes, Martin Horvat, Seth Johnson, Bruce Johnstone, Harriett Kolchak, Richard Labonte, Frank Lunney, Elinor Poland, Bob Roehm, Arthur L. Smith, John Steele, Bob Vardeman, and Stan Woolston. As this list is added to from day to day, there may be more than 19 by the time this report is published, but this is still not enough. There is always a turnover in the Welcommittee, so more volunteers are constantly needed. Why not write to Art Hayes and remedy the situation?

Fanclubs Bureau. Fred Lerner has a report in this TNFF, and is sending out questionnaires to obtain information on clubs, as the first step in activating the Fanclubs Bureau, formed late last year by Stan Woolston. If you are an officer or active member of some club that you think hasn't received a questionnaire, please ask Fred for one, and fill it out as completely as you can. Gathering such information has been attempted from time to time, and has often been defeated by three things: lack of sufficient response; constant changes in the information at hand; and (directly resulting from the first two) sudden loss of enthusiasm of the compiler.

I once tried to compile a sort of Yellow Pages of Fandom (more than just a club listing), and filled a large box with slips of information. By the time I got around to coordinating it into the planned booklet, a few months later, more than half of the information was obsolete. Fans constantly move, clubs are ephemeral, nothing in fandom stays put. So while I encourage Fred Lerner in this activity, I do not look beyond a frequent listing of current clubs in TNFF, and in small, easily up-dated leaflets. This, however, is still a worthy project, and fans and fan clubs are urged to cooperate, both for the N3F's benefit and their own.

At one time, the N3F was planned to be a federation of 'a fan clubs (hence our name), though it never was such in actuality. There is, in the N3F Constitution, the provision that a club can "join" the N3F as a member, paying dues and getting the publications and all benefits of a member except voting privileges. So, even though the N3F is not a true federation of fan clubs, it is still possible for it to serve as a coordinating body. Of course, club membership in the N3F is not required to participate in Fred Lerner's survey and the benefits that will result from it.

Round Robins. Haven't you even tried a Round Robin? No, it's not a fannish drink, it's a letter, that circulates among four or five fans, making the rounds of all of them and then continuing indefinitely. Sometimes subjects are set, but often they ramble in every direction as they circulate. If you want to discuss science fiction, or even write part of a story that will be added to by others (so that you won't recognize it when it comes back to you), try your hand at a Round Robin. Write to Richard Labonte for details; some organization is needed so that participants can be arranged for and to make sure that all know the rules.

Fanzine

Advisor. Having trouble with your fanzine? That first issue is the hardest. Why not write for advice to the N3F Fanzine Advisor, Gary Labowitz? What's the use of having a Fanzine Advisor if he doesn't get a chance to advise new fanzine editors on their publishing problems?

For once, Forry Ackerman is on the receiving end of an award -- the N3F Life Membership. It is fitting that "Mr. Science Fiction" should replace the late Hugo Gernsback, "The Father of Science Fiction", in N3F's honor roll. Current N3F Life Memberships also honor K. Martin Carlson, Frederik Pohl and Janie Lamb.

Speaking of Gernsback, I have an article that Pat Morgester sent to Elinor Poland, from RADIO-ELECTRONICS (Gernsback's own magazine). It is the story of Gernsback's life, written by Fred Shunaman (an SF fan), and it is quite interesting. We can't very well reprint it from a professional magazine, but I will send the article to anyone who wants to pass it around, Round Robin fashion. (The first inquirer gets the article, the second gets the name of the first one). Or, if you want to avoid all this, get a copy of the November, 1967 RADIO-ELECTRONICS.

Have you taken advantage of Elinor Poland's <u>SF Lending Library</u> yet? Write Elinor for details and a list of paperbacks and other sf available. Postage 4th class (Books) is 12¢ first pound, plus 6¢ for each additional pound, still cheap in spite of recent postage raises. The book rate does not apply to printed matter in general, such as fanzines, which must go at 6¢ the first two ounces, plus 2¢ for each additional ounce, thirdclass mail.

Don't think that the N3F is a club solely for the benefit of new fans. For instance, there's the <u>Collector's Bureau</u>. If you are interested in collecting anything from Superman to <u>Nuetzell</u>, write to Ned Brooks. You need only describe your collecting interests to join the Collector's Bureau, but many are getting involved in indexing, trading and otherwise furthering their collections toward Completism. THE COLLECTORS' BULLETIN comes out occasionally with lots of goodies.

The busy season is over for the <u>Renewals Committee</u>. Elaine Wojciechowski sent out over 150 reminders, which is quite a job.

Michael Viggiano has been active in the <u>Publicity Bureau</u>, getting news of N3F into various places.

The <u>Directorate</u> has been busy in the first few months, getting organized and discussing a whole raft of problems and projects, all grist for their mill. The <u>Secretary-Treasurer</u> is always busy, and <u>I</u> haven't been exactly idle either. All the officers this year are working hard to help the club -- look over the officer list and count how many are doing two jobs -- so this may soon result in a breakthrough of accomplishments.

Send <u>Bureau Reports</u> to me early in the month. I have no definite deadline, but I send everything I have on hand to Don Miller before the fifteenth. I keep forwarding stuff received later, but can't guarantee its inclusion. However, send information to me anytime on bureau activities, as there is always another TNFF coming up next month, so nothing will be delayed unduly in reaching the membership -- unless you delay it, by not sending it in.

Fanclubs Bureau ---

The purpose of the NFFF Fanclubs Bureau is to encourage and assist the formation of new science-fiction and fandom-oriented clubs in those cities and colleges which do not now have them; to provide new clubs with advice and assistance; and to publicize all new and existing clubs.

The Bureau will attempt to refer to experts any problems submitted to it. A "model club constitution" is now being drawn up, and copies will be available on request. A questionnaire has been prepared, and has been sent out to several known clubs. Anyone who is a member or officer of a club, or who knows of one, is urged to write the Bureau for a copy of this questionnaire. The completed questionnaires will be used to prepare a directory of North American science-fiction clubs, to be distributed to NFFF members free of charge, and sold to others.

The Bureau is interested not only in local general-purpose clubs, but also in specialized groups. So if you are trying to form a new club devoted to a particular writer or category of science fiction or fantasy, let the Bureau know about it. And if you are trying to form a local club, let us know: we may be able to give a few tips on recruiting.

Like any NFFF project, the Bureau can only be as successful as your cooperation will allow. Right now the biggest Bureau project is gathering information; so please write for a questionnaire and fill it out as soon as you can.

Mike Viggiano asks if the Information Bureau is available to non-members of N3F. Well, I don't check the roster when I answer questions, but I think the Information Bureau is a service of the N3F, and the column a feature of TNFF. If anyone really wants the benefits of N3F he should not mind paying dues to support their publication, and TNFF costs money to produce and send out. There is no charge for questions -- no stamped envelope is necessary. Just send them to me -- no more than five at a time, don't saturate me -- and limit the subject matter to science fiction, fantasy, fandom or the N3F. I may not know as much as other fans about such subjects, but at least I try to answer promptly (within a few weeks). What good is an oracle if it speaks only once a year!

Carl Brandon, Jr. writes that he wants to start publishing the Swedish FANAC again, and wants to know the names of current and regular newszines. (He's been gafia for a couple of years.) I gave him the addresses of S.F. TIMES, S.F. WEEKLY, and THE WSFA JOURNAL, then realized that's practically all there are, these days. If you know of another, or publish one yourself, send it to Carl to prove it exists. (Carl Brandon, Jr., Sällskapsvägen 7, Stockholm 48, Sweden.) Carl also wanted to know of zines in England, France, Germany and other countries, and I gave him the names of some European fans who I think are currently active (there's nothing more frustrating than writing to fans who have gone gafia -- they never answer). Carl was very active several years ago, publishing more than 100 fanzines (I hope he means issues, not titles).

Another question Carl asked was how to get the SCIENCE FICTION WRITERS OF AMERICA newsletter. THE SFWA BULLETIN is available to non-SFWA members only if they have a professional connection with the field, as agent, publisher, editor, anthologist, or reviewer. So possibly Carl is eligible in some such way, but most fans are not. Sub price is \$4 per year, bimonthly, and the editor is Terry Carr, the President of SFWA is Bob Silverberg, and the Secretary-Treasurer is Roger Zelazny. Sell that fan-fiction, guys, so you can join -- it's a good deal for authors. Or so I hear...

Bruce Johnstone wanted the address of Arthur C. Clarke (I don't have all of them, sorry) in order to try to get an advance copy of a speech to be given in Saginaw -- though I doubt any pro would want to give the ms. of his speech to fanzines before he makes it. (Bruce later wrote me that he had the address now (in Ceylon)).

Robert Gersman asked for the addresses of Lin Carter (of all people) and Mike Moorcock, and I supplied them. He wanted to send them his fanzine with a review of their books. Now this is a worthy cause, and I was glad I happened to have the addresses, though I really don't know them all. (Doesn't anyone want the address of Thomas Stratton?)

Bob also asked how to join FAPA. Hmmm. Well, you write to the Secretary-Treasurer, Bill Evans (I think), and get on the waiting list, and then you wait... five, six years. By that time you are no longer interested in fandom, unless you are really dedicated. That's how FAPA gets so many dedicated members. Or is it "hallowed"? ((Bill's address: P.O. Box 1015, Langley Park, Md., 20787. --ed.))

Pearson asked in COLLECTOR'S BULLETIN about the original pulp appearance of Malcolm Jameson's Atomic Bomb. It was "The Giant Atom" in the Winter, 1944 STARTLING STORIES.

And for Chester Cuthbert's information, no one has a copy of the December, 1953 SPACE SCIENCE FICTION -- it doesn't exist. Someday I'll find time to do research for that article on "Ghost Issues of SF Magazines", the ones that never appeared and the stories they were to contain. Such research is fun, even if time-consuming.

History of the Hannes Bok Sketchbook Folio (from the introduction included with folio):

"An old black accountant's ledger was Bok's sketchbook, which he filled by pasting in bits of drawings from envelopes, bills, file cards and other paper he found to hand when he had the urge to sketch something or record an idea. The drawings were done in pencil, inks, ballpoint pen and colors, which accounts for the uneven reproduction on some of the pages, since pencil and ballpoint are very difficult to photograph for offset. Bok pasted the sketches helter-skelter throughout the ledger, along with notes on mask-making, mixing of colors, opinions on art, and other paraphernalia. Bjorremoved a selection of sketches from 22 pages of choices, and mounted them (more or less) according to category or character. The sketches, reproduced here only slightly smaller than the originals, are arranged so that they can be framed as an entire page or cut apart to frame as miniatures.

"This folio represents much crosscountry effort on the part of many interested fans, starting with Ed Meskys in Northern California, who borrowed the sketchbook from its owner, Jack Gaughan, in New York. Ed gave the book to Bjo Trimble in Southern California, who did the pasteup and took it 50 miles to Fred Whitledge, who was to have done the offset work. However, things happened to prevent this, and the sketchbook moved with the Trimbles to Northern California, where it was sent to Seattle to be finally offset by Wally Gonser and Jerry Frahm. The folio was then sent back to the Trimbles for collating, and taken (along with the original sketchbook) to New York for distribution to fans at NYCon 3."
