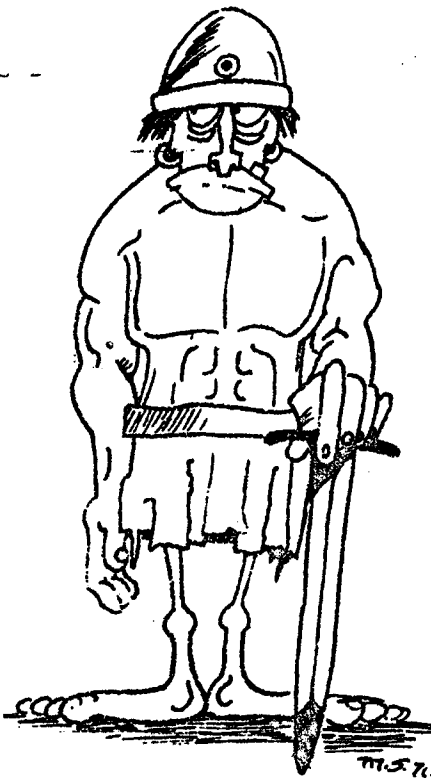

JOHN CAMPBELL

Science Fiction Editor Dies.

MOUNTAINSIDE, N.J. (AP) -

John Wood Wood Campbell, Jr., 61, science fiction writer and editor of a science  
fiction magazine for the last 34 years, died Sunday at his home.

Campbell edited "ANALOG, SCIENCE FACT AND FICTION", since 1937. The magazine re-  
ceived the Hugo award as the outstanding publication in the science fiction field  
nine times during the last 18 years.

He wrote a novel in 1938, WHO GOES THERE, which was then made into the movie THE  
THING FROM OUTER SPACE.

Campbell also was known as a scientific prophet and is credited with making many  
accurate predictions in the columns of his magazine. In 1939 he predicted that  
atomic energy would be released from uranium.

So much for an era that has come to an end. For me, World Conventions will be  
missing an essential ingredient. The convention in Boston will be less for his  
absence.

## Running for Office - Or Standing for Office:-

When someone runs for either the Directorate or the Presidency for the first time they will have a better chance to be elected if they go out and ask for the job - and show they are serious by presenting a platform and maybe follow up with letters to TIGHT BEAM and so on. Still, it seems a few will only put their names up. Sometimes for a second term they will write a brief "Platform" statement - and still get many votes - when a newcomer will be quite active as far as making their views go, and end up showing up with fewer votes with someone known in the club as being active in a bureau or as an officer the year before. All of this means a member who is active will be remembered longer than someone who does not have his or her name before members - and that, after they are in office, they may be re-elected without even providing a platform.

My own inclination is to keep platforms for myself to a minimum. There is always plenty to do, and anyway the year is only half over when it is time to advance one's name for office next year in the elections - so I am more apt to be thinking of finishing the current year than doing anything about the next year. This may make it easier for someone to get in office - and that is probably good.

However, it seems to me a director who seeks office again is doing the club a particular favor, because it is inevitably that in a first year, there will be times when he discovers some idea he had was not successful. The second year allows him to move ahead without stumbling around so much - though of course there is always a little adjustment to whoever else runs. Some are good idea-men; some can take other's ideas and suggest ways to make a coherent plan that will help the club or a part of it work better. Some may be sensitive to problems and be able to bring them up before they become present-time problems - and looking ahead is something that is very useful for all offices, both elective and appointive.

It is entirely possible, as in the past, we will have two or three directors who seek office again. There is a good chance they will be very helpful in bringing a sense of stability to the job - for, even though the Constitution and By-Laws serve as a guide for them, there is sometimes a tendency to either adopt all new ideas or be ultra-conservative. I doubt any three directors would be in either extreme; they must be willing to listen to ideas from others, and at the same time not let their own judgement be subverted. We neither need one-fan rule or officers who have such original ideas that they cannot agree on any practical thing.

The willingness to listen to others, and to correspond, seems to be the two things that officers in N3F need to do consistently. Some may be more willing to correspond than others - or may have the ability to be brief but to the point. Some may be more willing to listen to others before they act - and if so, they may find they are working with more of a feeling of success as a feed-back from others.

Actually an office-holder needs both patience and impatience. Patience helps him remain willing to take needed time throughout the year to plan and work with others for the mutual goals the Constitution and By-Laws spell out. Impatience helps him locate ways to overcome faults, through his own thoughts and through what others think.

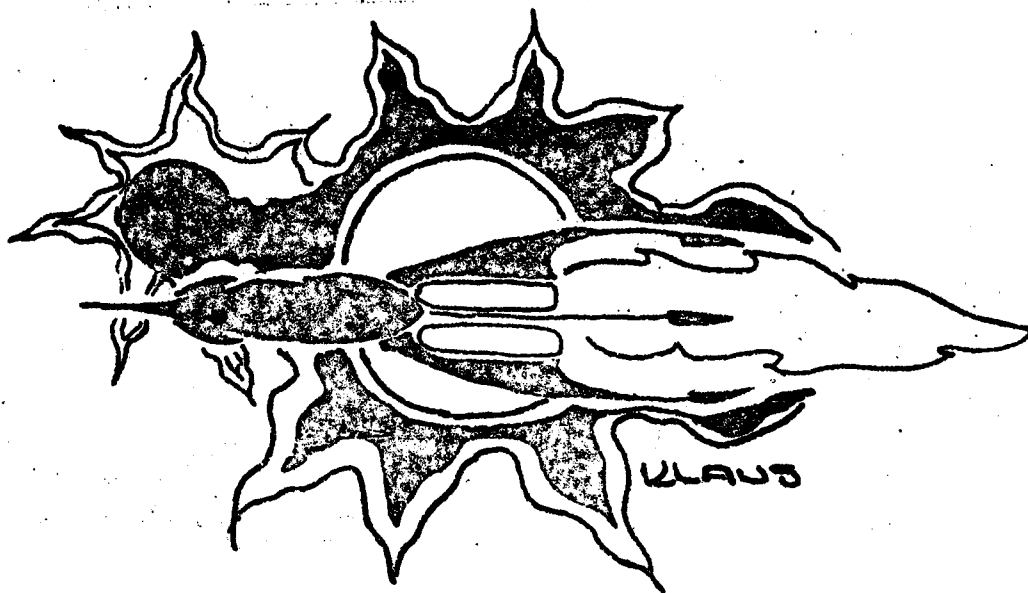

For the benefit of anyone who still doesn't know this, we are all set with a nice room furnished to us free by the convention committee. The location is right on the convention floor and can be found in the floor directory under Exeter-A. This floor is only one level off the street, incidentally, and can be reached by escalator from several directions.

Since it is right on the convention floor, we cannot serve any refreshments. This has happened at other conventions, and may in the future, so this year we are stressing an information and message center, another function we have always had whether or not we went so far as to promise it.

We have anew helper for this information, namely the Boston Public Library. They are so big and so enthusiastic that I'm not sure where to put all this help, since all we asked for was maybe some reading lists and pamphlets showing how visitors can use the library facilities. The BPL is the oldest public library in this country, and one of the largest, is well worth a visit, and a very short walk from the convention hotel to the central buildings in Copley Square.

You aren't likely to find many signs demanding silence. It got too ridiculous considering how chatty a Boston Library hand is. I was always one of the least gabby, so you can imagine. Anyway all librarians are friendly to SF these days, especially the ones interested in books for children and young adults. This field has a very strong record for both suitability and popularity there.

Of course, the main purpose of our convention room is just to have a place to relax in comfort and enjoy encounters with some of the wonderful people and far-out ideas that pervade this field. So elaborate preparations aren't called for, just what's fun and easy, so that is all I've done. The rest is up to those who attend.

It would not be right if I promise to be there myself, although the doctors are getting more encouraging, and my health is improving gradually. Nothing like a cheerful occupation to help there. In any case, my son, Mike Hill (who helps me with some of my writing and signed for the collaborative story HAIRRY, in IF a few years ago) has agreed to take care of the porters' tips and supervising the setup - and if I can, I'll be around there myself, relaxing and enjoying it also. The OVERSEAS BUREAU has started it's first robin of the year. Of the five people in the robin, one is from England, two from Canada, and two from the states. 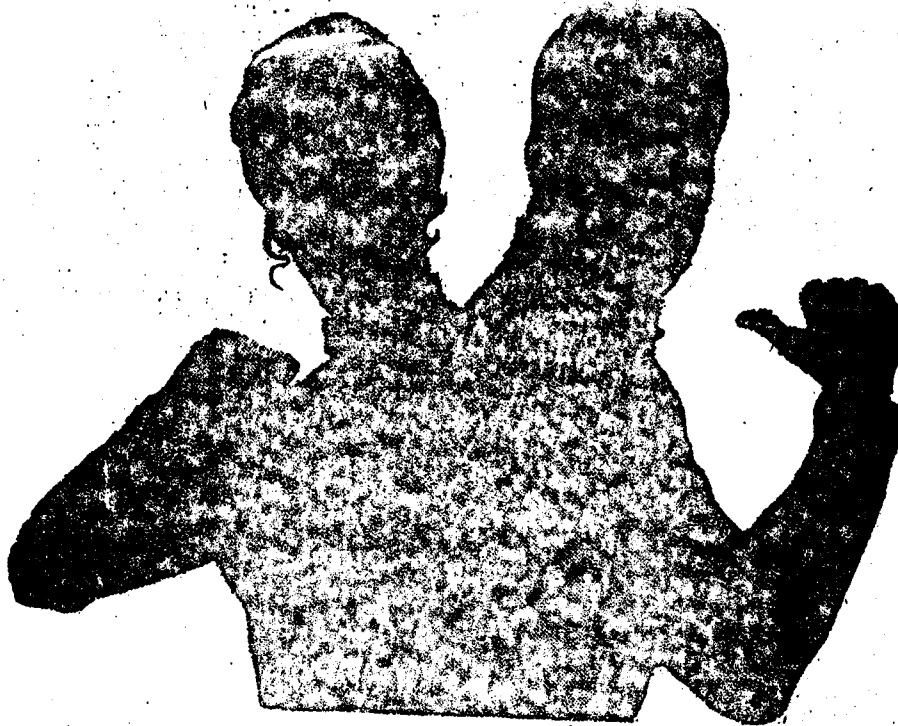

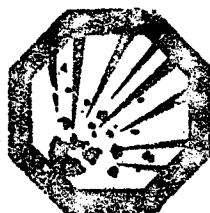

# CONSTITUTION OF THE NATIONAL FANTASY FAN FEDERATION

**PREAMBLE.** The activity that centers around science fiction and fantasy has grown to require organization in order that desirable objectives, beyond the achievement of single individuals, may be attained through united effort. Under this Constitution, The National Fantasy Fan Federation is established as an association of persons interested in promoting the progress of science fiction and fantasy, and in furthering its enjoyment by themselves and others.

**ARTICLE I - MEMBERSHIP.** (1) An individual is a member of the Federation during the period covered by the payment of his dues. Dues are \$2. per year. Dues cover the period from January 1st to December 31st, and less than a full year's dues may not be accepted by the Treasury; however, a new member joining after the first quarter of the year and submitting dues for the following year may pay only that proportional part of the current year's dues necessary to adjust the applicant's membership to the first of the year. Members have the right to vote in all elections and referendums and may participate in any benefits created by the organization. (2) An organization may become a member of NFF upon payment of dues as defined in section 1 and is entitled to all the rights and benefits of members as outlined in this Constitution except that said organization may not vote or hold elective office.

**ARTICLE II - OFFICERS.** (1) A President conducts the affairs of the organization. His appointments, suspensions and removals from office, whether the office concerned is elective or appointive, are subject to the review and approval of the Directorate, as are also his methods of procedure. (2) If, for any reason, the office of President becomes vacant, the Directorate appoints a President to complete the unexpired term. Any interim administrative duties are performed by the Chairman of the Directorate, during which time he may not vote in his capacity as Director except on motions of appointment. (3) A directorate, composed of five members, regulates the affairs and controls the finances of the organization, and may define the duties of any office or official of the association. (4) Decisions of the Directorate are by majority of its five members except in the following instances: by unanimous vote the Directorate may refuse membership to any person; expel any member by refunding the balance of his dues; and may remove the President from office. (5) Vacancies in the Directorate, whatever the cause, are filled by majority vote of the remaining Directors. If fewer than three Directors remain, the President shall appoint one or more up to the minimum of three. (6) Any person designated as Treasurer or otherwise empowered to keep or convey the funds of the organization must be over twenty-one years of age.

**ARTICLE III - ELECTIONS.** (1) The president and five members of the Directorate are to be decided by the membership in an annual election of those officers. Ballots for the election are to be distributed before October 10th and the elected candidates take office on the following January first. Any member may seek office by complying with the official requirements which are to be published in the official organ at least two months previous to the filing deadline. (2) No person may hold two elective offices at the same time. (3) Each member may cast one vote for each of the five candidates of his choice in the election of the Directorate. The five candidates receiving the largest number of votes are elected. Ties are resolved by majority agreement of those elected candidates not included in the tie. (4) Of the candidates for President, the one receiving the largest number of votes is elected. In case of a tie, the elected Directorate chooses a President from the tied candidates.

**ARTICLE IV - OFFICIAL ORGAN.** (1) The association issues a publication of at least bi-monthly schedule which carries, in addition to other material, a quarterly statement of the financial status of the organization, together with a listing of new members and their addresses.

**ARTICLE V - PETITIONS AND AMENDMENTS.** (1) Petitions of whatever purpose, endorsed by 5% of the members or twenty-five members, whichever is less, must, within sixty days after the Directorate receives them, be submitted to the membership for decision

VI-(2). The Official Organ shall contain a list of new members and renewals as reported by the Secretary-Treasurer; annual publication of the Constitution of the N3F; and annual publication of a roster of the membership. (3) The President may require the publisher to make up to 25 additional copies, to be kept on hand or sent where the President may direct. The cost of these copies will be re-imbursed at the same rate as the other copies made, in addition to any actual postage expense incurred in sending them where the President may direct. VI-(1). Postage is to be paid for at no more than '3rd Class' rate, unless the President directs the Official Editor otherwise. VI-1 - TIGHTBEAM. (1) The maximum amount that the Treasury will reimburse the publisher, in addition to the cost of postage, shall be 12¢ per member per issue. Postage is to be paid for at no more than '3rd Class' rate. (2) If the letterzine does not appear as scheduled, within the month in which it is due, the sum allocated for its publication will revert back to the treasury and not allowed to accumulate. However, the Directorate may vote to pay for any TB that does actually appear, however late, upon petition by the TB editor giving extenuating circumstances. (4) The Stand-by Editor is to be compensated for any issue of TB which he publishes providing that such publication occurs within two months of the originally scheduled date of publication, in a sum not to exceed that which would have been due the originally designated publisher, upon presentation of an itemized bill to the Secretary-Treasurer.

3. PUBLICATIONS BUREAU. The duties of the Publications Bureau shall be:- (1) To publish or to supervise the publication of all N3F publications not of a recurrent nature. (2) To distribute publications, for a price and on request, that may be of interest to the membership. (3) To furnish to the Treasury, not less than bi-monthly, an accounting of all funds received and disbursed by this Bureau, in such form as the Treasury may specify.

4. GENERAL. (1) Publications issued by subordinate bureaus of the N3F, but not generally distributed to the entire membership, shall be sent to the Secretary-Treasurer for information and record. In the case of N<sup>3</sup>APA, this shall be construed to mean the ALLIANCE AMATEUR or other official business publication, and not the entire mailing. In the case of the GAMES BUREAU, this means THE GAMESLETTER. (2) To facilitate an exchange of information, the principle officers of the BRITISH SCIENCE FICTION ASSOCIATION shall be provided with copies of each of the generally distributed club publications during their term of office, the cost to be borne by the Treasury of the NFFF.

5. NEFFER AMATEUR PRESS ALLIANCE. (1) All N<sup>3</sup>APA members must be members in good standing of the N.F.F.F.

6. OTHER. (1) The Constitution and Bylaws of the N3F and a roster of membership shall be published and distributed to the membership not less than once a year.

VII. RECISSIONS. Directorate motions in the nature of Bylaws passed prior to the original compilation and publication of these Bylaws and not included among them, are rescinded.

VIII. AMENDMENTS. Amendments to these By-Laws may be made with the approval of a majority of the Directorate.

(February 5th., 1970). These By-Laws above include all amendments approved to the end of 1969. While every effort has been made by this editor to make it correct, this does not constitute an official copy of the Bylaws, but merely an effort to give wide and frequent distribution to the membership. This is presented as a service by the WELCOMMITTEE)

BYLAWS OF THE NATIONAL FANTASY FAN FEDERATION  
(A compilation of regulations passed by N3F Directorate.)

I. **AUTHORITY:** Under the authority implied in Article II(3) of the constitution of the N3F the directorate shall establish certain By-Laws to regulate the affairs of the organization, such Bylaws to be effective when approved by a majority vote of the Directorate as set forth in Article II(4) of the constitution. The Secretary of the N3F shall keep a permanent record of the Bylaws, and current Bylaws shall be published in the official organ of the N.F.F.F. not less often than once a year.

II. **THE PRESIDENT.** The following shall be included among the duties of the President: (1) The President will keep himself informed on the activities of all the officers and committees of the NFFF; so that he may bring before the Directorate matters which need their attention. (2) The President will bring to the attention of the Directors all important Constitutional dates. (3) The President will call attention to violations of the constitution. (4) The President will submit to the incoming Directorate an estimated budget of funds for the operation of the NFFF during the coming year. Said budget will be submitted to the Directorate no earlier than 15 December and no later than 31 December.

III. **THE DIRECTORATE.** (1) The Chairman of the Directorate shall report to the membership all measures passed by the Directorate. (2) Copies of all official Directorate correspondence shall be sent to the President and the Secretary-Treasurer. (3) Official Directorate correspondence and statements shall be regarded by the officers of the N3F as "DNQ". This "DNQ" shall in no way be construed to preclude an officer publicly expressing his own views on any subject whatsoever. (4) Each Directorate shall adopt standing rules of procedure. (5) The Directorate representative to N'APA shall have the following duties: (i) To bring before the Directorate any items of business regarding N'APA which need Directorate attention. (ii) To act as trouble shooter in cases where there has been an actual or alleged dereliction of duty on the part of the Official Editor of N'APA. (6) The number of LIFE or Honorary membership created by Directorate vote may not exceed 1% of the total membership of the N3F. This rule shall not operate to reduce the number of existing LIFE membership at any time.

IV. **THE SECRETARY-TREASURER.** (1) The Secretary may bill the treasury, as needed, for expenses incurred in the discharge of the office, including purchase of supplies for new members, the sum not to exceed \$35. per year. (2) The Secretary will maintain a current membership roster, and will report new memberships, and changes of address to the President, Official Editor, Chairman of the Welcommittee, and such other officers as the President may direct, not less than once a month.

V. **ELECTIONS.** (1) All candidates must, by the filing deadline, have paid their dues for the year in which they will hold office if elected. (2) In addition to the regular candidates listed on the ballot, members may write in the name of any member in good standing as a candidate for any elective office. Any candidate so elected must submit a written statement of his willingness to serve plus dues for the year in which he will serve to reach the Secretary-Treasurer within 14 days of his notification of election. In the event of non-compliance with the foregoing the election will be voided and the candidate receiving the next highest number of votes for that office will be declared the winner. (3) Deadline for filing in the N3F elections shall be August 1 of each year.

VI. **PUBLICATIONS.** (1) **THE NATIONAL FANTASY FAN** (i) The maximum amount that the Treasury will reimburse the publisher of TNFF, in addition to the cost of postage, shall be 13¢ per member per issue, except for the election issue, the ceiling for which shall be 15¢ per member. Any unused portion of this allocation may be permitted to accumulate for the purpose of paying for the increased size of the election issue. All unused funds shall revert to the Treasury at the end of the year. Postage is to be paid at no more than the '3rd Class' rate, unless the President directs the Official Editor otherwise.

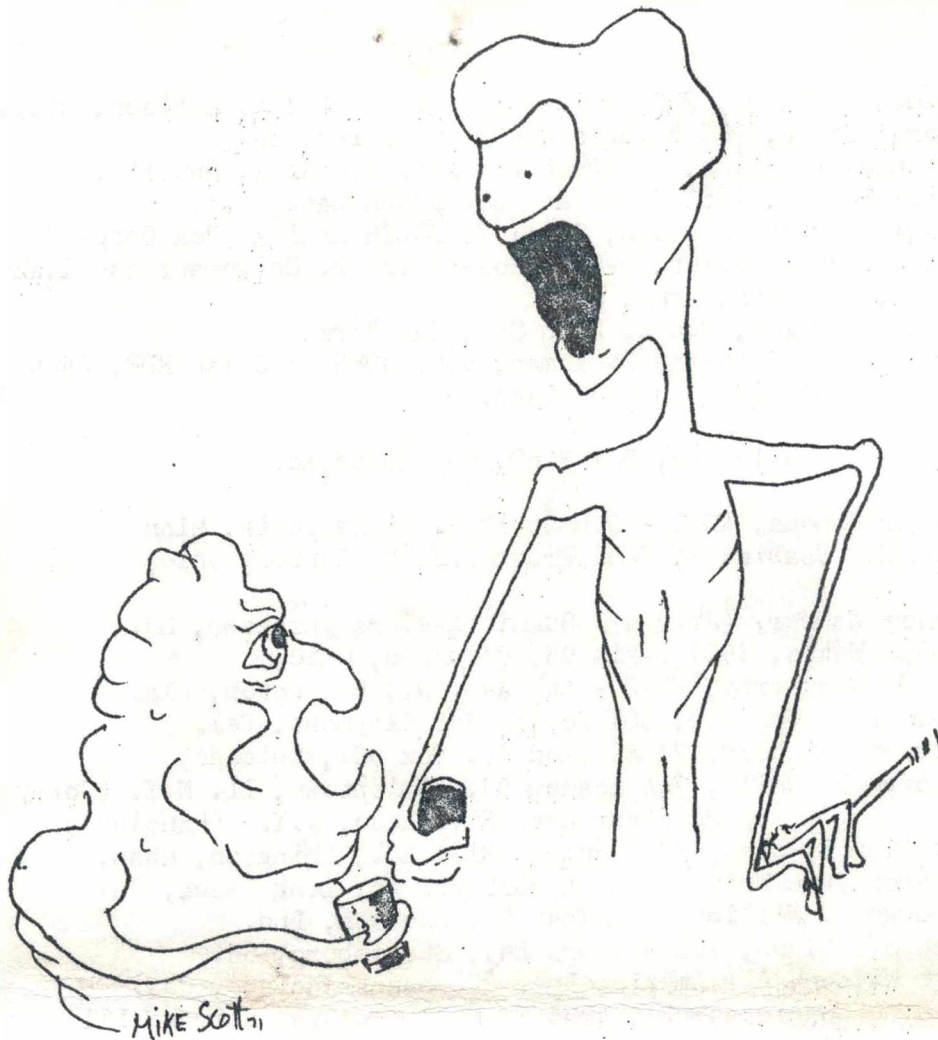
