THE NEW BOOK REPORT

One is never quite sure about Phil Farmer . . . In Mother Was a Lovely Beast: A Feral Anthology (Chilton September, \$6.95), one finds extracts from Farmer's own "Memoirs of Lord Greystoke" --- i.e., the real Tarzan, who has some diverting, uninhibited, and often very pointed observations to make on the mores of men and anthropoids. Also included are "Shasta of the Wolves" (a Canadian Mowgli), "Tarzan of the Grapes," and several others. If nothing else, Farmer (or his editor) ought to get a special award for Best Book Title of the Year!

Most of the nine stories in Gordon R. Dickson's retrospective collection, Ancient, My Enemy (Doubleday, October, \$5.95), date from the '50s and '60s and deal with men struggling against hostile environments in distant space. Desides the well-known title story, you'll find here "Love Me True" and --- one of my anti-bureaucratic favorites --- "The Bleak and Barren Land." The Best from IF: Volume 2 (Award, September, \$1.25) is a predictably professional collection, made memorable by the inclusion of Michael Bishop's novella, "Death and Designation Among the Asadi." In Fred and Geoffrey Hoyle's latest epic, Into Deepest Space (Harper, September, \$6.95), the Yela are menacing Earth again. Dr. Dick Warboys, natch, has to give up his weekend to see to it. The Hoyles, in the past, have turned out some rather good novels. This isn't one of them.

The Good Doctor is up to his old tricks in The Best of Isaac Asirov (Doubleday, September, \$6.95) --- the LP-producer's gimmick of collecting old material and re-issuing it in slightly varying packages. I mean, as great as they admittedly are, how many times can "Nightfall" and "The Martian Way" survive being anthologized? Unless you're the rankest of neos, save your money. In her preface to Stellar I (Ballantine, September, \$1.25), the first of another new series, Judy Lynn del Rey (Ballantine's new sf editor) says she wants "stories --- not mood pieces, vignettes, or character sketches" --- and that's exactly what you get here. No standouts, mostly well-known names (with a few newcomers), and some good, solid professional storytelling. The Hounds of Skaith (Ballantine, October, \$1.25), Leigh Brackett's sequel to The Ginger Star, is every bit as good as the first one (if you dig fantasy/adventure yarns). Fine pacing and still an admirable imagination. Still another series-to-be is Dorothy C. Fontana's The Questor Tapes (Ballantine, October, \$1.25), based on the failed Roddenberry TV script; pretty idiotic stuff, unfortunately.

In The Day of the Burning (Ace, October, 95c), by Barry Malzburg, it's 1981 and a certain NYC welfare investigator is contacted by the Galactic Overlords. He has 12 hours to unravel a particularly difficult case. If he does, Earth joins the Federation --- if he doesn't, Earth becomes a smoking cinder. A bit tedious, but the high mordant humor comes through in spots. Contrariwise, On a Planet Alien (Pocket Books, October, 95c), also by Malzburg is a skittishly written alieu-contact tale of the far future, where the Bureau sends incomprehensible messages and the ship's Captain may be going mad.

Larry Niven and Jerry Pournelle (where'd he come from . . .?) seem to have written a winner: The Mote in God's Eve (Simon & Schuster, October, \$9.95!). It's the 4th Millenium, humans are travelling between the stars almost instantaneously, and wars of secession are destroying the old Empire. Then the Moties cruise quietly into Imperial space . . . and from that point on, it's pitched battles, contests of intellect, gadgetry, theology, politics, and lots of action!

This isn't sf, but for Chesley Bonestell rans (and we are legion), Chronicle Books has just published The Golden Era of the Missions: 1769-1814 (September, \$8,95/\$3.95 paper), by Bonestell and Paul Johnson. This recreation of California's mission period includes 22 of Bonestell's full-color paintings.

FINAL BULLETIN!!! Ace Books has acquired world distribution rights for posters (18" x 14") of Frank Frazetta's cover paintings for Ace. The stated price is \$3.00 per poster. They'll be issued in sets of four and there will (eventually) be 16 in the series. Huzzah!
