AUSTIN IN '85 MEETING HELD

Texas fans gathered Saturday, March 5 in Austin to discuss the Austin in '85 NASFiC bid plans and tour the central hotel site, the Austin Hyatt Regency. Despite the three-hour meeting, the gathering had the flavor of a Texas fan family reunion. The consensus was that the Austin bid was not just a one-city bid, but a Texas bid. Fans from various Texas cities and organizations have pledged to sponsor a bid party each night of the '83 Worldcon.

Willie Siros and Robert Taylor, Austin in '85 bid founders, directed the meeting and explained the Worldcon and NASFiC rules for everyone. Houston fan / APA enthusiast and ConStellation programming chief Johnny Lee provided data on the volunteer needs of the '83 Worldcon. Many Texas fans have already signed up to work at ConStellation, and others were encouraged to do so. Look for the throng of western hats at Baltimore. A statewide support of the Australian '85 Worldcon bid was also encouraged.

Several co-ordinator assignments were also made during the meeting, including: Parties: Marye Wexford of the Dallas-

Ft. Worth Metroplex.

Publications: Austin's Pat Mueller.

Programming: Metroplex fan and twotime AggieCon Chairman (some people never learn) Becky Matthews.

Mailroom: Sven Knudson of Austin. Sven will also work with Austin's Mack Pitchford on integrated state-wide computer applications. Plans were also begun

to transport the vast quantities of Shiner beer and chili necessary for the nightly Worldcon parties. Among other topics discussed were the \$12 annual membership dues to FACT, Inc. (Fandom Association of Central Texas) and the \$2 presupporting membership price for the Austin in '85 membership bid. Both FACT and presupporting membership are open to fans world-wide.

The party began shortly after dinner, with much drinking and merry-making, and lasted until the early hours of Sunday. Crash space was provided for out-oftown folk. Several fans arose early Sunday and headed to San Marcos for MicroCon. Others staggered to a late morning brunch gathering. Some just slept. The next FACT meeting will be held Friday, March 25 at AggieCon.

LOCAL BOYS MAKE GOOD AND OTHER NEWS

Austin writers Bruce Sterling and Howard Waldrop have made the Nebula ballot. . Bruce for his novelette, "Swarm," and Howard for his short story, "God's Hooks."

In other pro news: Lewis Shiner has sold "Deserted Cities of the Heart" to Omni. Another Shiner story, "Mystery Train," will be in the May Oui, and "Nine Hard Questions about the Nature of the Universe" will be in a summer issue of Fantasy and Science Fiction. Lisa Tuttle's novel, Familiar Spirit, a paperback original, is on the stands. Lisa and her husband Chris Priest will be back in Texas during April. Bruce Sterling and William Gibson sold their collaboration, "Red Star, Winter Orbit," to Omni. Look for it in a summer issue. Bruce's "Sunken Gardens" will appear in Omni later this year, as will Howard's "Man-Mountain Gentian." It seems Ellen Datlow, the fiction editor at Omni, did a great deal of buying when she attended last year's ArmadilloCon in Austin.

If you're reading this at AggieCon, definitely pick up a copy of Modern Stories. M.S., billed as "the magazine that

bites the hand that feeds it," contains fiction and art work by Bud Simons. William Gibson, Bruce Sterling, Howard Waldrop, Lewis & Edith Shiner, Doug Potter, Joe Lansdale, Marian Henley, and many others. This will certainly be a collector's item due to its uniqueness. Pick one up and enjoy. And while you're at it, grab a copy of The Huggybunnies. The art work and story line in this comic book are quite different from anything you've ever seen or read. Created by Steve Utley, The Huggybunnies are a refreshing change from the usual fare of superheroes. Another collector's item.

Texas fans Robert Taylor and Willie Siros have crossed the Red River twice this winter to promote the Austin in '85 NASFiC bid. In late January they attended ConFusion in Detroit, one of the cities competing for the bid. Dressed in cowboy outfits, they served chili and jalapenos at their party, along with Shiner beer. "Of course, we passed out lots of flyers and buttons, along with hundreds of cookies in the shape of Texas," said Siros.

"The chili and peppers really wowed them," added Taylor. "Mike Glicksohn, a big name Canadian fan, had a real tough fight with one of the little green monsters. The pepper had him on the ropes a few times, but Glicksohn finally won, with the help of a couple of beers."

The traveling Texans left their mark at the ConFusion banquet, too. Each table sported its own Texas flag! "It was a lowkey prank," said Siros, "but it let them know we had been there."


