ADVENTION 81 this years National Convention went over rather well.

Registration topped 300, which probably makes it the 3rd largest con yet held in Australia. My sources felt that the programming was very heavy going - Lee Harding gave me a rundown of the programming on the last day and it sounded like all they had to do was add in a few fannish items, GoH speeches, a masquarade and a number of films and they'd have more than enough for a 3 day con. According to my sources the only anybody whose anybody types who weren't there were Bangsund, Gillespie and Hirsh. I don't know what the other two did that weekend but I enjoyed myself while at the 30th Melbourne Film Festival. Unfortunatly among the weekends duds was Robert Altman's Health, with his Guintet going close.

Both of them are unlikely to be released in Australia, so for that reason I'm glad to have seen them. But even if they were released out here I doubt I'd see them again. As a Robert Altman fan that really makes me weep. Stil, we'll always have Mashville.

VIC 3000. The GoH is Jack Vance, with Eric Lindsay as FanGoH. I
can't resist asking the question of what is it with this continual
practise of the Australian National Convention to be honouring
overseas big name pros while our own professional writers miss out.
Certainly the cost factor involved in bringing such people out here
is enormous and in very few cases would the name of someone drag in
enough people off the street to return a profit for the convention,
which makes me wonder why convention committees even put themselves
up for such budgecting problems and stomach ulcers. (Then again,
why not go all the way and bring out Xavier Hollander.)

THE SITE FOR the 1983 National Convention is tentatively listed as Sydney. Not much is known about the con, I presume because the group which won the bid is the group which was actually bidding for the 1982 NatCon. One aspect that is known is that should the Australia in 83 worldcon bid be successful, Sydney will give up the 1983 NatCon as the two groups have a large overlap in people of whom most energy would go into the worldcon to the detriment of the NatCon.

I REALLY SHOULD point out that some of my above terminology is incorrect, as at the business session of the Australian Science Fiction Society . Amendents were made such that it is now the Australasian SFS, which allows for bids to be made from New Zoaland. An amendent was made to standardise the design of the Ditmar. A proposal was put forward to make the Queen's Birthday weekend the permanant date for the convention. I'm glad it was rejected as it is something that could restrict future con committees from putting on their best possible convention. Us students just ask . to be considered when putting a date to future NatCons, especially as students make up a large percentage of convention attendees and prospective attendees.

DUFFee JOYCE SCRIVNER and accompaniement Denny Lien were in Australia from (let's see if I got this right) the Tuesday before to the Friday or Saturday after Advention. While in Melbourne (their first stop) they stayed at the home of Christine and Derrick Ashby and the only large scale event that I know they attended was a party held at Merv Binns' place on the Wednesday, where Denny showed the obvious signs of jet lag. From Melbourne they went on to Advention, then on to Canberra where they stayed with Jean Weber. From there it was a sentimental trip to

Cooma, as Joyce had spent a number of her younger years there when her father worked on the Snowy River Project. Eric Lindsay then played host to them in his, no doubt, silverfish ridden home at Faulconbridge. Then it was no-stops- East back to Minneapolis. At least that is the way Joyce explained it to me at that Wednesday night party. At that stage they had no plans to stay in Sydney as they didn't know anyone there (which says a lot for the amount of fanzine activety generating out of Sydney), but I guess they lined up something while at Advention. As with Joyce and Denny, Joseph's stay in Melbourne didn't take in a weekend, which must've made it hard for a number of people to meet our guests.

TAFFman STU SHIFFMAN was at Yorcon, the British Eastercon, and doubtless had a good time. That's more or less all I can say, not having heard anything else (I knew I had forgotten to ask Joseph about something).

THE FUTURE OF the fan funds is more or less assured if the number of names being tossed around as probable candidates is any guide. So far the people I've heard as possibles for the 1982 GUFF trip to the British Eastercon or the 1932 DUFF trip to the worldcon, Chicon IV are John Bangsund, Greg Hills, Daryl Mannell, John McPharlin and Leigh Edmonds. For the next UK to USA TAFF trip I've heard mentions of Alan Dorey and D. West, and for the USA to UK trip the names being tossed around are Avedon Carol, Taral, Grant Canfield and Gary Farber.

FORERUNNERs new editor is Shayne McCormack (PO Box A491, Sydney South, NSW 2000), and at a time that I thought no-one from Sydney, apart from Jack Herman, was interested in on-paper contact with the outside world, Shayne has decided to continue FR as an Australia wide newszine.

DEVO'S TOUR of Australia has been postponed, much to the annoyance of one of the editors. Fortunately, The Cure's tour is still on. Meanwhile the records at the head Irwin's most played list are U2's BOY and The Birthday Party's PRAYERS ON FIRE. The Birthday Party would have to be the best group in Australia. Except that at the moment they are in England.
