The discussion at the meeting was to encourage **KaCSFFS** members to attend and potentially help with the organization and work on the event. There would be no monetary requirements from **KaCSFFS** only fans willing to help at an SF event which we've all done at one time or another. Since that initial discussion we hadn't heard anything from the committee.

The latest news on the Centennial Planning Committee is that Alan Koslow will be taking a less prominent role in the organization of the event. Everyone has to gaffiate from the pressure of fannish activities at some time or another and it's Alan's turn this time around. I'm sure that even with his stepping down as director of the Planning Committee he still hopes to attend the event itself. He was very enthusiastic about the idea.

## DS9 Actors, Clubs Unite For Hurricane Katrina Fundraiser

A group of Star Trek: Deep Space Nine actors and fan clubs have united to help the victims of Hurricane Katrina, which devastated parts of Alabama, Mississippi and New Orleans, the future birthplace of Captain Benjamin Sisko.

The United Federation of Fans, a group endorsed by Rene Auberjonois (Odo), Chase Masterson (Leeta), Andrew Robinson (Garak), Armin Shimerman (Quark) and his wife Kitty Swink (Luan), Alexander Siddig (Bashir) and Nana Visitor (Kira), is holding an eBay auction of autographed items and memorabilia to raise funds for hurricane survivors. Items include autographed photos of Auberjonois, Masterson and others, a t-shirt from Jeri Ryan (Seven of Nine)'s Men Cry Bullets, an audiobook of Patrick Stewart (Picard)'s reading of A Christmas Carol and several signed trading cards. The site also has links for donations.

Meanwhile, Variety has reported that Scarlett, the new project of former DS9 writers Robert Hewitt Wolfe and Hans Beimler, may be moving to another city despite being set in New Orleans. A spokesman for Lifetime said that the network was "looking at all sorts of options. Things are vague right now."

The pilot concerns a horror writer, said to resemble Interview with the Vampire novelist Anne Rice (a longtime New Orleans resident) who finds her characters coming to life. The magazine reported that shooting could conceivably move to another city.

And William Shatner (Kirk), as well as other performers at the Emmy Awards on September 18th, will wear magnolias in memory of the victims of Hurricane Katrina, noted SFGate. Emmy host Ellen DeGeneres, a Louisiana native, last hosted the Emmys in 2001 in the wake of the 9/11 attacks.

■ **The Shawnee Mission West Overland Express and Jazz Lab bands** will perform at Pizza Maker, 8725 Bourgade St., Lenexa, at 7 p.m. A portion of that evening's sales will be donated to the Red Cross.

### SATURDAY

■ **Boy Scout Troop 50** will hold an all-you-can-eat pancake breakfast. 7 to 11 a.m. Broadway United Methodist Church, 74th Street and Wornall Road. \$4 suggested donation.

■ Financial donations will be collected two hours before the **University of Kansas football game** at Memorial Stadium in Lawrence.

### SEPT. 18

■ **Cutting Loose Hair Salon**, 12675 Metcalf Ave., fund-raiser from noon to 5 p.m. All haircuts will be \$30 with 100 percent of proceeds donated to hurricane relief.

### ONGOING

■ **Kansas City Power & Light Co.** has launched a campaign to raise up to \$1 million for hurricane victims. The company will process contributions and match all contributions up to \$500,000. I did not like it because I don't like history novels. Well I liked it because it WAS history. It had me looking up the various places mentioned and information on the Yukon Gold Rush. I did like the History part, but not the SF party of the novel. I found it a bit choppy, history, then alternate fantasy, got tired of the Raven and the foreshadowing elements of the book.

It drove me nuts that Rosa (main character) son dies in one time line, only to have her lose him again in the alternative time line. Yes, but she doesn't lose him until World War I. Everyone dies, he just dies a bit later. She also loses her second husband twice too.

I think he (Haldeman) wanted the fantasy element and just shoved it in there. However the historical research was very good. I like the back story on Rosa and found her very believable and well developed. I wish the Raven (fantasy) character was written a bit better. I found that to be very annoying, a constant foreshadowing. It almost reads like he was padding the story.

This is not his (Haldeman's) best work, but I did not feel like he phoned it in, like the last one we read.
