Recipe of the Day

THE ULTIMATE CHOCOLATE CHIP COOKIE

Ingredients: -----

1-1/4 C. flour

1/4 tsp. soda

1/8 tsp. baking powder

semisweet - sweet chocolate, finely chopped

1 C. sugar

9 Tbs. unsalted butter, cut in pieces

1/4 C. light corn syrup

1/4 C. water

3 eggs chilled

1 T. vanilla

1-1/2 C. chopped walnuts, divided

Preparation:

- 1. heat oven to 325 degrees F. Line a 13X9 1/2" pan with double layer of aluminum foil. Butter the bottom of foil.
- 2. Stir flour, soda, baking powder and salt together. Put semi sweet chocolate in separate large bowl.
- 3. In a medium saucepan combine butter, sugar, corn syrup and water. Cook until butter melts, sugar is dissolved and mixture comes to a boil. Pour the hot syrup over the chocolate and let it stand for a minute or two to melt chocolate. Whisk until smooth.
- 4. One at a time, whisk in the eggs, blending until smooth. Whist in vanilla and flour mixture, until batter is smooth. Fold in 1 C of the walnuts and 6 oz of the Swiss chocolate.
- 5. Spread batter into pan. Top with remaining walnuts and chocolate.
- 6. Bake for 4-50 minutes, until toothpick comes out with a few moist crumbs. Cool, cover with plastic, and let sit 6 hrs. at least.

Well, it all started with a letter to my mother from Germany. In our weekly call, she told me she received a letter from a woman in Munich with the same last name as hers. The woman had a book of the family history for that name and it included my father's death and my mom's address. She wanted to know if my mother had any family history to pass along. Her husband's family was from a small island in the Balkans.

So we talked about family history for a while. My father died when I was young and my mother didn't know his family very well. They had also mostly died when my father was young, except for an aunt who came over from the old country. We had some information about the family from my aunt (his sister) by way of the elderly aunt, but not much. The family was from the Ukraine, but were ethic Poles. I didn't think that we were related to anyone in Germany, especially since the family name had been changed when they came over. I suggested that I check the net for the family name.

So, I did. I was amazed that I got as many hits as I did. I did find three places in the US that featured the family name - Arizona, California and Washington state. I was pleased to find a home webpage in Washington, as I knew my father's brother had moved to Seattle in the 1940's. I think I found my cousin's webpage - my uncle's grandson - and sent him an e-mail. Oddly enough, he is graduating with an M.S. in Computer Science this year, as am I, and has an interest in computer security, a field I used to work in.

The Arizona and California families are probably from the German family and not related to us. However, they are no less interesting. The California family owns a dairy farm and one of the women is a popular country dance choreographer. The Arizona family is part of the German family and the old families of Arizona and quite active in family history research.

There was also a anestheologist who had several medical papers on the web. There was also someone with the same name who was part of a philosophical graduate student project. It's possible it was the same person, but the dates didn't seem to make it likely.

Being on a roll, I decided to try the other side of the family. I have an uncle who has access to the web and has been interested in family genealogy for a long time. For a long time we thought that our family and one of the same name in New Paltz, NY, were related. Since we're from Northern NY, it seemed likely. However, he found out this was not the case. So, knowing that, I looked for the name on the web. I found a number of references to the New Paltz branch and they are probably why there is a USS naval ship with the family name. Our branch of the family are in the Air Force. I also found a possible fan in Toronto with the family name. Since the family is French Canadian, I dropped him a note with the probability we're

related.

One surprising hit was in Australia. The gentleman there is very involved conspiracy theories, alien abduction and the like. I didn't read much of what he wrote - to see if he was for or against - I wanted to move on to other things - but I think he was for, from the titles. It might be worth researching at a later date, but I again, I don't think we directly related.

I also found a number of doctors and genealogy pages. I also found one home page that may be a cousin I knew in childhood. He's a song writer in Nashville, but I need to ask my uncle if he knows what the children of our great uncle are doing nowadays.

One very long shot was on a website for an upcoming movie - *John Carpenter's Vampires* from John Streakley's book (which was titled *Vampire\$*, if memory serves). I thought that maybe one of the cast or crew had the family name. It turned out to be one of the character names!

So it was a pretty interesting two hours on the net and a lot of possibilities for finding out what's happening in the family. If you haven't done a web search on your family name, it might prove interesting.
