The SciFi Channel is trying for a new look with a new lineup of shows on Friday - Sci Fi 2.0. Replacing their usual Friday shows are *Poltergeist: the Legacy, Farscape, Sliders*, and *First Wave*. The new lineup premiered Friday March 19th, with a "sneak preview" on USA network (which owns the SciFi channel) the Sunday before. Oddly the "sneak preview" was not the series premiers, but episodes further down the road. I'm not sure why they chose to dump people into the middle of a new show and expect to hook them. It's also a mystery why they used a WWF person to "host" the shows as well.

Poltergeist: the Legacy is a Showtime series that is having a run on the SciFi Channel as well as currently in syndication. If you saw it on Showtime, these will be repeats; if you've been watching in syndication, these will be repeats. If you've never seen it before, it'll be new. *Poltergeist: the Legacy* doesn't follow the movie in much other than name. The Legacy is a group of scientists who investigate supernatural phenomenon and are based in San Francisco. What can one say about *Sliders*? Well, it's gone downhill from its first season on network TV. Moving it to the SciFi Channel kept it on the air cheaply, but it didn't improve the quality of the stories from the second season. In its third or fourth season, it added an aliens-invade-earths-and-want-slider-technology thread.

The two new series show some promise. However, if the Sci Fi Channel stays true to its past, both series will turn stupid and very skiffy. Both are original series for the SciFi channel from some big names in the entertainment world.

Farscape (8 PM, with repeats at midnight and Saturday afternoon) is from the Jim Henson Muppet Workshop and features a number of muppets along with the human actors. *Farscape* is the story of John Crichton (Ben Browder), an American astronaut who was sucked into a wormhole while testing a space craft of his own design (like NASA does that every day!). He finds himself in a different part of the galaxy (or perhaps a different galaxy) dumped into the middle of a space battle. Despite being defenseless, he manages to avoid the other ships, except for one fighter which bumps into him and explodes on a convenient asteroid. His ship is then drawn into a huge ship, where he finds breathable air and a strange band ofpeople. Consisting of two humans (Anthony Simcoe and Virginia Hey) and two muppets, they are former prisoners on the prison ship who have taken it over and are trying to escape from a race (Peacekeepers) who polices that part of the galaxy. They also have a reluctant fifth person (Claudia Black), one of the Peacekeepers who was captured by them and was branded a traitor by her superiors.

Their "living" ship needs some sort of supply to keep healthy, so after escaping the space battle, they head for a planet for supplies. The and the woman warrior escape the ship, but her commander isn't in a mood to be useful; he wants revenge for our killing his brother. So they all escape again and head out for parts unknown.

At this point, I don't know if he'll be forever looking for a way to return to Earth, or just going along with his new found friends exploring the galaxy. *Farscape* has obvious kid appeal with the muppets (although we adults like them too and they must save a lot on makeup). A little too obvious kid appeal is one of the muppet characters who farts helium under certain circumstances. Ha ha. As usual the science is iffy and the stories tend to be thin, but it's just starting.

First Wave (10 PM, with repeats at 2 AM and Saturday afternoon) has a pedigree of a different sort, as it was created by Francis Ford Coppola. While he may not be a name in SF, Coppola did write and direct cult hit (many years ago) *The Conversation*, which taps into the current wave of paranoia that runs through modern entertainment.

Am I the only one who's tired of the man-discovers-aliens-secretly-taking-over-earth series that seem to be constantly cropping up? Of course, *First Wave* is going one better by adding the "predictions" of Nostradamus as a blueprint as to what the aliens are doing. Wow, Nostradamus able to foresee this as well as everything else!

First Wave features Sebastian Spence as Cade Foster the bland lead, a former theft who married a good woman and is trying to go straight by working for a burglar alarm company. I was amazed that he found a company who kept important papers in a safe in the conference room; I thought most companies today

stored important stuff on computers and corporate espionage was the real danger. I also thought building management would provide security rather than individual companies using alarms. Considering SciFi's parent company USA network shows *The Net*, based on the poorly done movie of the same name, I guess they didn't want another "person who's identity was deleted running from an omnipresent group" competing with them. Back to the plot.

Foster has strange visions, mostly of a head taking to him. He manages to find the person the head belongs to, but not in time to prevent his suicide. Since the person was a cop, Foster uses the cop's identity to trace another man, a millionaire, who had visions that drove him to kill his family. Visiting the man in the hospital, he hears about aliens taking over and where to find an important clue. He and his wife find the clue, which turns out to be an old book of Nostradamus predictions (written in English). This all has something to do with the suicide cop who sent the hero's police record to his employer so he would be fired and the insane millionaire, who also is dead by the time out hero returns to the hospital.

So, he and his wife hold up in a hotel, credit cards canceled and no jobs. While they are making love, she sprouts tentacles and chokes him (by this time, we know what's coming). While he's out, several people come in, leave his dead wife's body and talk with the tentacled one about how smart they were to clone his wife years ago.

You know the rest - he wakes, is arrested for murder, escapes and we wait for the next episode.

It's hard to tell from the little I've seen, but the Sci Fi Channel has committed to 66 episodes on the strength of the premise and the people behind it. I believe they committed to 22 episodes (a season) of *Farscape*, by contrast. *First Wave* wants us to think this is more sophisticated then the other shows about aliens hiding among us, but it's more of a retread. Rich feels it's a lot like the old *Invaders* series starring Roy Thinnes, but not was good. The first episode was of, but the second one went down hill rapidly, but it was fun to make fun of.

Well, that's about all for now. My quilt guild is having a show at the end of April and I need to finish up on the quilts I want to enter. Have a nice spring!
