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THE ARTHUR C. CLARKE CHECKLIST by Eric L. Larson

The following pages contain the most complete bibliographic information on the works of Arthur C. Charles that I have been able to assemble. The checklist is divided into six sections.

1--STORIES THROUGH 1971: This is an alphabetical listing of all of Clarke's short stories through 1971. Each story has a number beside it that is later used as a reference number.

2--FICTION BOOKS TARCUGE 1976: As far as I have been able to determine, this is a complete list of all of Clarke's fictional works including one book edited by him. Each work is listed and identified as to type. If a book is a short story collection or an omnibus, the contents are listed also. Stories are listed by their index number mentioned above.

3--NON-FICTION BOOKS THROUGH 1976: I also believe this listing to be complete. When I was able to find it, the original date of publication is listed. There is quite a bit of doubt on a number of these. Many of the books have seen revised editions. This, however, is not indicated. Yourre lucky to be able to locate any edition of some of these.

4--MAGAZINE ARTICLES THROUGH 1976: This is by far the most incomplete of the sections. The data included is accurate, but I am certain there are a large number of works not listed.

5--APPEARANCES IN THE JOURNAL OF THE BRITISH INTERPLANET. AY SOCIETY: This is, unfortunately, my only listing of non-U.S. publications.

6--ARTICLES ABOUT ARTHUR CLARKE THROUGH 1976: Over the years, a number of interviews, profiles, and the like have been published. The ones listed here will often appear (at least in part) on flyleaves and backs of books.
